**Along The  
 EDITOR'S  
 BEET**

Local residents in the habit of wearing rose-colored glasses can boast, "I told you so" since the so-called business lull of middle June has ended and general business conditions start on a sudden up-grade.

It is interesting to note the housing situation which a few weeks ago gave outward appearances of being superfluous. The Journal had

many "For Rents" in the classifieds and a few pessimists commented that the population was shifting from this area. Almost overnight, most of the houses and apartments were filled and this office is being swamped with families looking for some kind of housing.

The renewed business activity can be attributed to the farms of this area which are now producing some of the world's finest potatoes that are being shipped from Nyssa. Six produce firms are grading the tubers and shipping them to market at the rate of dozens of carloads a day. The payrolls of these firms, to say nothing of the money coming into this valley for the potatoes, has a definite favorable effect on Nyssa's general business condition.

Spuds aren't the only crop that's giving business a shot in the arm. Many farmers are starting their second cutting of hay and wheat is being harvested and going to market at prices that are bringing smiles to the face of anyone at all interested in a farming area's economics.

Within a short time, Nyssa's cannery, the Idaho Canning Co., will be operating full blast with a large payroll and another outlet for farm crops.

All this will be followed by the beet harvest that will mean unlimited activity on the farms, on the highways and at the Amalgamated Sugar Co., one of the world's most modern factories that provides a sizeable payroll the year 'round and a "stupendous" payroll during the sugar campaign.

These farm crops we've been

rambling about have meant a large and sudden growth to Nyssa as well as to the surrounding area. As the community grows, many of us are inclined to overlook the fact that it has taken new people to make the growth. Like most of the luter-mountain west, this community is no longer a place "where everybody knows everybody else."

Postmaster Lloyd Lewis said this week that many Nyssa business firms and individuals are neglecting to place complete addresses on mail being sent out. We remembered two or three statements we had returned the first of the month because we failed to include a street address or box number.

We were shown the "workings" of the postoffice where the local mail is sorted for rural routes, city boxes or one of two city carriers. This postoffice now serves approximately 6,000 people and the mail must be handled by several clerks before it arrives at its destination.

It is true that every effort is made to have the mail delivered, regardless of the completeness of the address, but in many cases the addressee is unknown to the person sorting the hundreds of letters mailed every day.

To have the complete address on a letter is not necessarily a favor to the postoffice personnel, it may mean speedier delivery of letters being sent out and afford more time to process all the incoming mail.

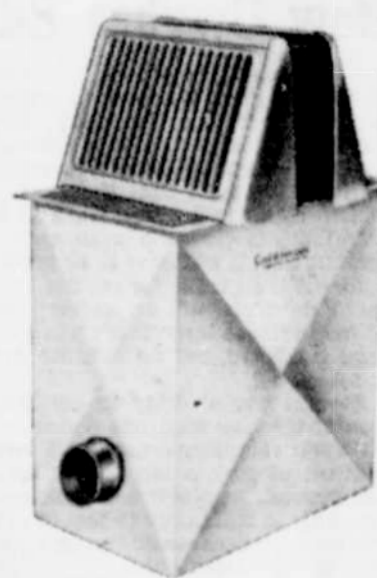
