Price Difference On Potatoes Hit

Why were potatoes \$1.75 or less for No. 1's to the grower, when they were quoted at \$4.90 to \$5.50 at Chicago?

Some dealers upon being questioned as to the low price of potatoes, have nothing to say; others give the story that the flood has tied up the rail terminals, and the shipments are delayed; another story half-heartedly advanced is the quality of potatoes in this area does not compare favorably with those in other districts. According to railway maps, we find Chicago some distance from Kansas City, and it does not appear likely that this flood would affect the shipment of potatoes from the northwest to the

Chicago area. If the quality of the potatoes from the Snake River valley is not comparable with those from other places, the highly touted maturity clause which has been added to the inspection rule and regulations, certainly missed its mark.

Packing charges are 78 cents. Freight rates are not over \$1.25. This \$1.75 plus 78c plus \$1.25 freight, gives \$3.78. This certainly allows a very liberal mark-up.

As to marketing potatoes in this area, there is a decided lack of information available when the harvesting period arrives. All during the year, from our county agent's office, comes a flood of material available over the radio, on how to grow our crops, even how to check the temperature of hay in hay-mows (very few farmers in this region have hay-barns). Surely there could and should be information as to the daily local potato market. Farmers daily listen to the cattle reports, but even though a vast number of farmers are also depending upon the sale of their potatoes, no item of information on the fluctuating prices is available.

Possibly a co-operation would be the answer to the problem of other years; namely so-called "over-production". A great many people have come to realize there is no problem of "over-production", but rather a problem of adequate distribution. Better and cheaper ways of handling produce must be worked out, in order that the multitudes of people can afford an adequate diet. The dealers and other organizations connected with handling produce have failed to answer this problem.

The potato economy affects not only the growers, but the entire community. Last year many of the growers of both potatoes and onions, suffered considerable financial loss. Conditions this year appeared to be such that many of these people would recuperate their losses of the previous season. However, the original question as to why potatoes are \$5.50 in Chicago and \$1.75 or less in the Snake River valley must be answered and an adjustment made in order that the grower may continue in business.

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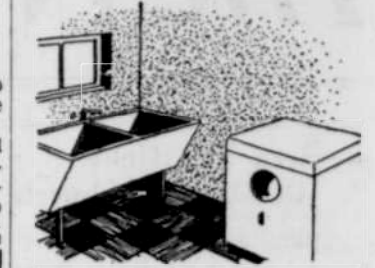

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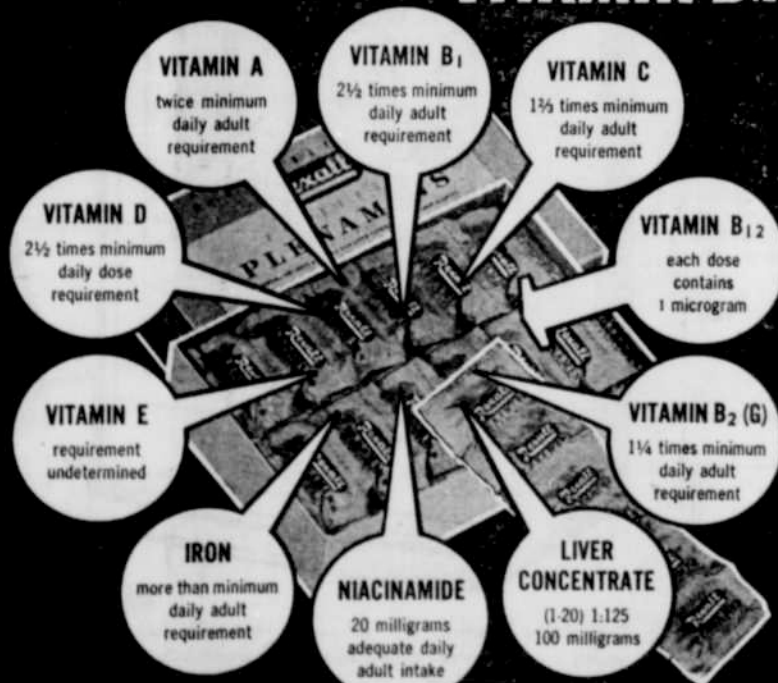
