Weed Burner Interests Farmers, Ditch Officials

(Continued from Page One)

in proper proportion with air at the
point of combustion.

Principal of the machine's destruc-
tive power is the withering heat that
leaves the burner with a roar under
the high pressure of the gas fuel.

For maximum efficiency, it is
recommended by Jackson that two
trips be made over the same area.

First time over, the demonstration
showed, weeds are caused to wilt,
evidence of which shows up about
two to three hours after the burn-
ing.

The second time over is recom-
mended after three days, when the
weeds are in a dried state and burn
readily. This final operation also de-
stroys weed seeds that are resident
in the top soil layer, Jackson claims.

It is claimed for the weed burner
that it will burn 16 miles of ditch
bank a day at an average cost of
\$10 for fuel per mile. The machine
travels at a walking pace and re-
quires a two-man crew—one to op-
erate the tractor and the other to
man the burner controls.

Jackson advocates two burnings
a year, spring and fall, for complete
control of weeds by the propane gas
method. He predicts that within
three or four years, complete control
of the weed problem can be obtained.

The machine, less tractor and op-
erators, will be rented to farmers at
a nominal hourly rate. Although
only one machine is available at the
present time, Jackson says his
firm has materials ordered for the
manufacture of two more. Eventually,
six or seven will be available.

Wednesday morning the burner
was demonstrated before ditch offi-
cials, including Willard Robinson,
manager, Gem Irrigation district,
and Paul House, manager North
Board of Control.

After a mile of ditch was burned
two miles north of Homedale, both
officials expressed interest at the
results. Arrangements are being
made by Jackson for leasing of the
equipment at no cost to the ditch
companies for periods of up to a
year's time.

Nyssa Chamber of Commerce is
sponsoring Tobler's to the state
tournament, where it will be known
as the Nyssa entry.

The team will leave by private
autos Friday morning.

Channel Catfish Caught In Snake

Two channel catfish were caught
Thursday morning near the Snake
river bridge at Nyssa by Jerry Gyl-
lenskog who has the distinction of
landing fish seldom caught in this
area. Each fish measured 22 inches
and the two together weighed slight-
ly more than eight pounds.

The young fisherman, was accom-
panied by Billy Low on the fishing
expedition, and reported that he
used a No. 1 hook with several an-
glerworms attached. Using sinkers,
the hook was allowed to sink into a
deep hole where the fish took the
bait.

Although channel cats are known
to be in the Snake river in this area,
other local fishermen acknowledge
that only on a few occasions have
the fish been attracted to any kind
of lures.

Wahlert Improving At Local Hospital

W. K. Wahlert, manager of the
Desert Seed Co. in Nyssa, who has
been confined at the Malheur Mem-
orial hospital the past week for med-
ical care, is reported today to be
slightly improved.

Although diagnosis has not been

Owyhee Park Site Visited By Park Officials

Final plans for development of a
road and park site at Owyhee res-
ervoir will come up for discussion
this Thursday evening when the
Nyssa Boat club meets at 8 p. m. at
the city hall.

Planning has taken on a greater
significance and gained impetus fol-
lowing the visit to the park site last
week of several national park offi-
cials.

A. C. Keuehl, regional landscape
park architect for the National Park
Service, with offices at San Fran-
cisco, headed the visiting party. With
him were E. M. Hillon, park planner,
also of the Bay City office, and Neil
Baterfield, of the Portland office of
the National Park Service.

Other officials included F. Gordon
Whittaker, of the Boise office of the
bureau of reclamation, and Lawrence
Merriam, Oregon State park com-
missioner.

After viewing the site, the park
service officials informed local boos-
ters of the proposed park that plans
for it had already been drawn,
drawings of which were shown by
Keuehl.

In the near future a park service
man will be sent from the San Fran-
cisco office to stake out the park
site.

Preliminary plans presented by
Keuehl call for a boat house, floating
pier, cabin sites picnic grounds, con-
cessions and parking space for 150
cars.

Preparations Near Final Stage For Fair

Posters, window cards and other
materials have been posted through-
out the Nyssa area, focusing atten-
tion on the approaching Malheur
county fair, which runs Aug. 27-30,
at Ontario.

Final preparations are now being
made by the fair board and other
officials, and fair facilities are be-
ing readied for one of the best shows
in Malheur county's history. The
five large barns, land products hall,
and the Oregon national guard ar-
mory building will be filled to ca-
pacity, and a 60x90-foot tent will
serve as the judging arena.

In order to accommodate commer-
cial exhibits which must be protected
from the weather, the fair board is
arranging tent accommodations, to
be located at the west entrance to
the armory. Interested business
firms are urged to make reservations
immediately. Nearly all of the avail-
able space for machinery and equip-
ment displays has been reserved, and
fair goers can look forward to seeing
an excellent display in this depart-
ment.

Pre-registration of all livestock to
be exhibited at the Malheur fair
should be completed by Aug. 21 in
order to assist the fair board in
planning the livestock show and to
insure adequate accommodations for
all animals, Harry Sandquist, secre-
tary, said today.

A program of personal contact to
encourage a larger, more repre-
sentative land products show has
begun as a result of a meeting of
interested farmers and crop field-
men, with O. D. Dearborn, superin-
tendent of the agriculture division.
Special effort is being made to de-
velop a land products show that
will present to the fair goer a true
picture of Malheur agriculture.
