

### NEIGHBORING TOWN TOPICS

Ontario's main street is to have a new and brighter lighting system. Representatives of the Idaho Power company appeared before the city council Monday night and reported that two of its three year lighting plans was in effect. The third year of the plan called for new lights on the main street of town. The council approved new steel light poles which are to be placed eight to each block on the four main business blocks on Oregon street. —Ontario Argus-Oregon.

The Hell's Canyon Run is now in regular operation, on a charter basis, it was announced by Blaine Stubblefield, owner of three river boats whose headquarters are now at Homestead. The short 39-mile trip is from Homestead upstream to the Ox-Bow where passengers lunch at Indian Creek; then return to Homestead, and down 11 miles to Kinney creek rapid, which is near the middle of the main gorge. The cliffs at Big Bar are over 900 feet high. The 11-mile Homestead-Kinney run crosses a half dozen good rapids.

The new 17-foot Rogue River type boat, "Red Wing," just received from Glen Woodridge at Grants Pass, comes upstream almost as fast as it goes down, with one 25 h. p. engine; carries five medium passengers or four heavies.—Weiser Signal.

Edgar Deardorff, Prairie City rancher, will be presented two trophies and take part in a state-wide contest as a result of being chosen as Grant County Grassman of 1952. The winner was announced following a meeting of the range committee of the Grant County Stockgrowers' association at the county agent's office in Canyon City Friday night.

A new feature of the award this year will be presentation at the county fair and rodeo next month of two trophies sponsored by George Barry of Dayville, who last year became the first Grant county grassman of the year to win the state title. As in the past, the 1952 winner will be entered in the state contest. —Blue Mountain Eagle.

The new truck route which will relieve some of the truck traffic in

the business section of the city is now nearing completion. The new route, which is now being given an oil surfacing, extends from the Geo. Sedlmayer corner on Payette Heights south to the connection with highway 52. The new project is being financed through the co-operation of the City of Payette, Payette county and the State of Idaho. Those in charge of the work report that the route will be completed around September 1st.—Independent-Enterprise.

Some interesting visitors at the Parma Agricultural Experiment Station this past week were Dr. Gosul Deslander of Pelotas, Brazil and Mrs. Deslander and Mahomet Zahir from Iran. Dr. Deslander is a plant pathologist and he is here studying vegetables and seed production. Mahomet Zahir is from the United States State Department and was in Idaho to study agricultural industries.—The Parma Review.

The county health department indicated today that other than the one Kirby child, no other cases of polio had come to its attention. The department said that Nyssa is designated as a treatment center and for that reason the child had been taken there after diagnosis here.—Baker Record-Courier.

It is quite possible that drilling operations on a test well for oil will begin northeast of New Plymouth next spring, according to Sam Raymond, partner in the Stamey-Raymond oil company of Nyssa which is now obtaining oil leases in the county. Raymond said the largest "oil structure" in the county lies near New Plymouth. There is also a structure between Payette and Weiser and the company is concentrating on these two areas and plan to drill three wells next spring.—Payette Valley Sentinel.

Idaho agriculture is in such excellent financial condition that the state's farmers and ranchers found it necessary to borrow less money from banks during 1951, and savings and income of farm and ranch families reached record levels, accord-

ing to Robert Thomas, manager of the Shelley American National bank, who represents the Idaho Bankers association as county key banker.—Shelley Pioneer.

The Boise engineers in charge of drawing plans for the proposed sewerage disposal plant for the city, are busy making the revisions for the second presentation to the State Board of Health, says Mayor C. E. Lewin. "After that," says Lewin, "After we know the size, capacity, etc., that the state approves for us, we'll have to figure out how to raise the money and we can't lose any time because our deadline is July 31, 1953, less than a year away. After that we will not be permitted to dump any more sewage as in the past."—Malheur Enterprise.
