County Library Lists Books for Circulation

Saturday, Sept. 6, the following books, which are on display this week, will go into circulation at the Malheur county library in Ontario. "A Few Acres and Security" by Lloyd Steelman, is subtitled "Your complete guide to independence with little capital and lots of contentment." It gives advice on poultry raising, livestock, fruit growing, and truck farming, and is well illustrated.

A father writes of the victory of his 10-year-old son over polio in "No Time For Tears."

A history of 4-H club work is presented by Franklin M. Reck in "The 4-H Story."

Leon Howard is a recent biographer of Herman Melville, who became known for his Moby Dick a hundred years ago. This book is called simply "Herman Melville."

A new novel of mountain-climbing is "The Grand Crevasse," by Roger Frison-Roche, translated from the French. Mont Blanc is the scene of the romance between a mountain guide and a city-bred girl.

Paul Gallico's "Trail by Terror" tells of the ordeal undergone by a young American reporter intent upon learning why men behind the iron curtain had confessed to crimes they did not commit.

A group of theatre-loving college people, including such names as Jas. Stewart, Henry Fonda and Margaret Sullivan, played in a Cape Cod theatre during the summers of 1929-1932 as the university players. The story of their all-day rehearsals, seven-nights-a-week performances, and provision of their own costumes and properties—all for room and board and five dollars a week—is told in "But Not Forgotten," by Norris Houghton.

The American colonies in the century between 1664 and 1775 are the subject "Liberty and Property," by Roy Coleman.

"The Art of Color and Design," by Maitland Graves, discusses elements and principles of design and color organization, optical illusions of color, color and interior decoration and psychology of color.

Bertrand Russell, noted philosopher and 1950 winner of the Nobel Prize for Literature, now writes "New Hopes for a Changing World," which argues against fear and in favor of the good life and the life of reason.

"Creating Hooked Rugs," by Vera Underhill and A. J. Burks, recommends this activity as therapy and an outlet for self-expression.

Community PMA Elections Announced

Community PMA elections will be held in each of Malheur county's seven farm communities Sept. 3 through Sept. 12. Glen L. Hutchinson, chairman of the county PMA committee announced today.

Farmers in each community will vote for three farmers to serve on the community committee, for a delegate to the county convention to elect the county PMA committee for 1953, and for alternates. Voting will be by mail. In general, any farmer is eligible to vote if he as owner, operator, tenant, or sharecropper is participating or is carrying out practices in accord with programs administered by the county PMA committee.

Hutchinson emphasizes that the effectiveness of agricultural conservation program operations and of price support and marketing programs will depend a great deal on the community committees who are voted in at these elections.

Concentration of agricultural conservation program operations in 1953 on the problems of individual farms adds to the need for able committees. They will be expected to help each farmer in determining the conservation needs on his farm and in making the most effective use of ACP assistance and available services in carrying out most needed practices.

Since this program has to do with the protection and improvement of the soil and conservation of water on the farms of Malheur county, community committees are in a key position in the fight for continued production.

The chairman urges farmers in each community in Malheur county to look over the field carefully and make sure that farmers are elected who are best qualified and who will have the time to devote to the job.
