Nyssa Youth Goes To Luzon

Norman D. Case, son of Ed Case of Nyssa, Oregon, will sail this fall for the Philippine Islands to begin a three-year agricultural assignment with the Board of Missions of the Methodist church. He will work on Luzon.

Mr. Case is one of 47 young men and women to take special training this summer at Hartford, Conn., for the "Asia-3" program—three years of work in India, Japan, the Philippines, Malaya, and possibly Korea. Nearly all are lay workers. Their specialties include agriculture, journalism, nursing, business administration, teaching, youth work, and evangelism. All are single college graduates, chosen for outstanding qualities of leadership, scholarship, and Christian dedication. All except two are between 21 and 28 years of age.

Mr. Case received his B. S. degree from Oregon State college, where he was elected to Alpha Zeta agricultural honorary society. He also served as president of the Wesley Foundation and spent last summer in Cuba with a Methodist work camp. He has worked for the U. S. forest service during other vacations from college.
