

NEIGHBORING TOWN TOPICS

Weiser's 12 mill tax levy will continue next year and become the fifth consecutive year the assessment on Weiser property has remained unchanged.

City Clerk Ray Huff pointed out that the city levy has been steadily decreasing since 1944 when the tax levy was 21 mills. In 1945 to 1948, it was decreased to 13 mills and in 1949 the present rate of 12 mills was established.

Seven of the 12 mills are earmarked for the general fund, one-half mill to the band, one mill for the library, one-half mill for bond interest and three mills designated for the bond sinking fund.

Huff said that Weiser with its 12 mill levy, is one of the lowest in the state for the maintenance of any organized city administration. —Weiser American.

A plan to combat shoplifting was outlined by Police Chief Tindall Ragsdale to merchants at a meeting Tuesday morning, which received their wholehearted approval.

The plan calls for establishment of permanent records at the police station on all shoplifters, including "mug" shots, as they are convicted. The records will give complete details of each case and the information will be available to all merchants. —Weiser Signal.

At a meeting of the Plymouth city council Monday night one dozen pair of heavy overshoes were purchased for the use of firemen on both the city and rural fire runs. Low bidder for the heavy duty

overshoes was the Idaho Department store with a bid of \$80. Members of both volunteer fire groups have never had boots or overshoes furnished for use on fires and some firemen have ruined good shoes from water and fire while on duty. Mayor C. H. Galvin explained.

He reports that firemen are well equipped now with wearing apparel, which includes heavy slickers and overshoes. —Payette Valley Sentinel.

Robert Brown, owner of the Parma Telephone company, started the remodeling of the present telephone plant this week, in preparation for the installation of the new dial system he expects to have in operation by the first of the year.

With installation of the dial system, a general rearrangement of the office will take place, and when completed will give Parma patrons and customers of the Parma Telephone company good service comparable to that found anywhere. —Parma Review.

A contract for the re-seeding of 2,750 acres of range land north of McDermitt was awarded to James Trummel of Middleton this week by the Bureau of Land Management. Trummel was successful with a bid of \$160 per acre. The re-seeding is being done under a federal halogeton control bill.

A. K. Hanson, manager of the Vale office of the bureau, said the new re-seeding area when completed late this fall, will raise the total acres re-seeded to crested wheat in the area during the past year to 11,805. —Malheur Enterprise.

With the local track in excellent condition, it is expected that Hatch's speed record will fall during the two remaining races of the current season.

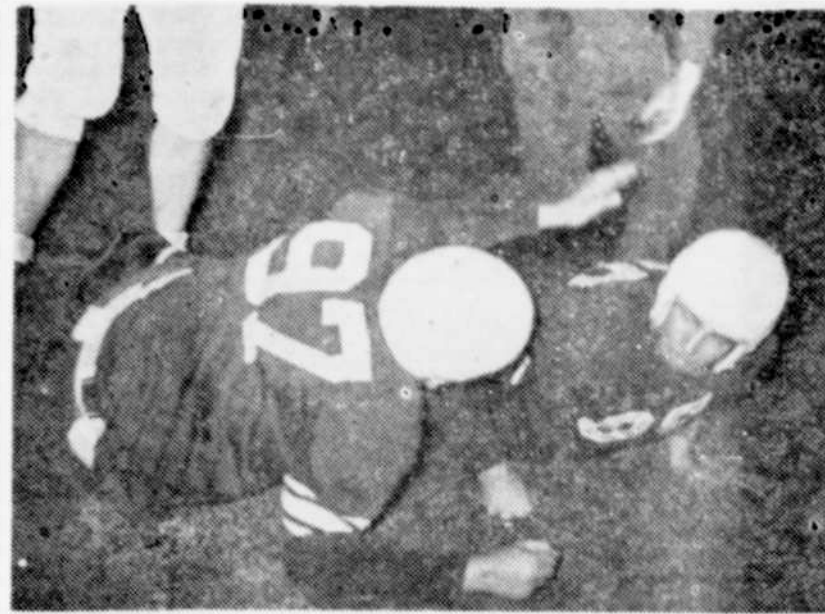
Last Sunday's Trophy A Dash was taken by Herb Hosley, of Boise. Holton is a three-time winner of this trophy event.

Bulldogs Upset Favored LaGrande Team In First Football Encounter

Nyssa high school's Bulldogs won their initial inter-conference football game last Friday night on their own grounds against the LaGrande Tigers by a two-touch down margin, the first coming on a dramatic 90-yard sprint by Halfback Junius Tanner and the other resulting from a series of line bucks.

Both tries for point were ineffectual—one falling wide and short of the crossbars, the other being smothered behind the Bulldogs' line.

It cannot be said that the better team won, for LaGrande's Tigers amassed the greater yardage total both in the air and on the ground, completed the most passes and gained the most first downs.

The Bulldogs displayed spurts of smart football, though, and were more alert to convert the breaks to pay-dirt advantage.

Tanner Sprints 90 Yards
First such break came in the early minutes of the first quarter, when Tanner plucked a pass from the finger-tips of a Tiger and sprinted 90 yards for T. D. No. 1 behind clever blocking by teammates.

Tanner's dash came on the third Tiger play after the Bulldogs lost the ball on a punt from the one yard line. LaGrande had lost the ball at this point on downs after the Bulldogs stubbornly resisted a scoring threat from virtually the one-foot line.

Nyssa's second score also started from a lucky break. Following a Bulldog punt to the Tigers in the third quarter, the LaGrande receiver was charged so hard he lost possession of the pigskin. In one of the game's only periods when the Bulldogs' line showed strength, the home team marched steadily toward the Tiger goal.

Lovejoy Scores
It was Quarterback Lovejoy who lunged across the final two yards

on a line buck to make the score 12-0.

The Tigers made two scoring threats—that time when they had the ball on Nyssa's one-foot line in the first quarter and at the final gun, when they were in possession of the ball on the Bulldogs' five yard stripe.

Nyssan Building Bowling Center At Gay Way, Ida.

Bowling alleys are now being installed at the former Gay Way dance hall on the Idaho side east of Ontario and will be ready for the grand opening the first week in November, George E. Vaughn of Nyssa announced. Vaughn recently purchased the Gay Way and has spent considerable time on the Pacific coast investigating all types of equipment and other established bowling alleys.

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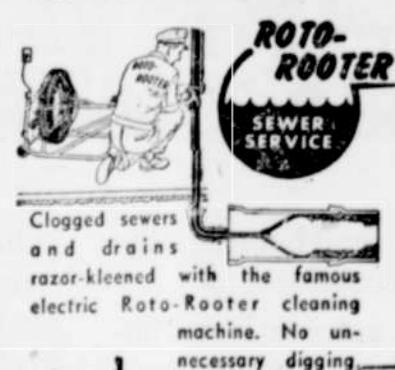
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
