Steinke, accompanied on the hunt by Elwin Haroldson, Lawrence Oden and Ted Teske, brought his six-point buck out Thursday a week ago. He dropped the animal from 35 to

40 yards with an arrow through the rib section, the barbed shaft reaching through the body. He used a 57-pound bow and broadhead hunting arrow.

Steinke and his wife, Lola, left early this morning for the same area to try for an elk during the special archery season, which begins Friday. They will take in the Bulldog-John Day football game Friday night, and resume hunting Saturday.

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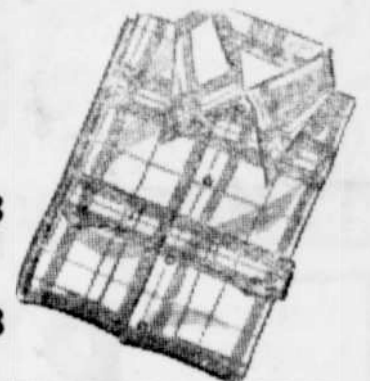
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
