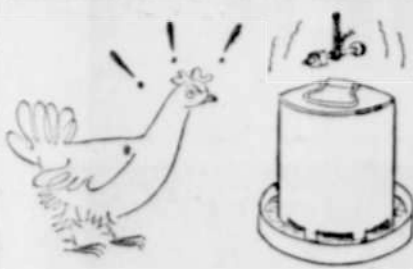
Norland-Hetrick Nuptials
