

Selective Service Gives Pointers To Young Men and Registrants On Obligations, Privileges Existing

Although most families have been, or are being affected by selective service in one way or another, there still is a large amount of confusion regarding registration of men as well as various obligations they have after registering. Mrs. Ruth L. Ingebritsen, clerk of the county board announced.

A series of articles was prepared by the Oregon state headquarters of the Selective Service system in an effort to familiarize the general public with all factors pertaining to se-

lective service. Styled primarily for dailies with a day-by-day accounts, Mrs. Ingebritsen has suggested that excerpts from the various articles be combined into one article.

The state office explains that it has always been an objective to attempt to get factual information concerning the responsibilities rights and privileges of registrants as widely disseminated as possible.

The Oregon headquarters stressed the fact that it must be borne in mind that information given is correct as of the date it is prepared. The regulations and the act itself are subject to change, and it is very likely that data correctly given at one time may at some later date be obsolete and will then be restated.

Of prime importance, which is repeatedly stressed, is the necessity of registrants keeping in touch with their local boards, giving them full and detailed information. Above all, registrants should always obtain information from the nearest local boards or state headquarters of the



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carrying out of those purposes and the particular local board to which such transfer is affected is then merely acting the "agent" for his local board.

The Questionnaire

Shortly after a man registers he receives from his local board a questionnaire which must be filled out completely, signed and returned within ten days of the date it is mailed. The completed questionnaire, together with the registration card, becomes the basic document on which all future action in his case rests. It is important that great care be taken for accuracy and completeness.

The questions should be thoroughly studied and the answers must be written legibly for every question that is applicable.

Registrants are warned that unless they sign series XIV of the questionnaire service system and never depend on rumor or hearsay.

Two Groups Affected

There are, currently, but two general groups which are presenting themselves for registration. First, and by far the larger, are the young men attaining their 18th birthday. These men are required to register within five days after their birthday.
