5 Years Ago Oct. 10, 1947

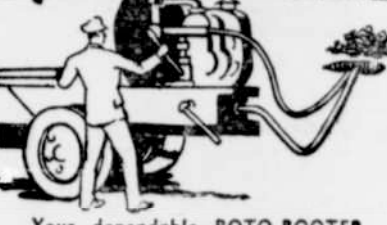
Dr. Edward McNamara, of Chicago, has become associated with Mrs. Charlie Grider returned from

35 Years Ago Oct. 19, 1917
The Hotel Western is temporarily vacant, the former hostess, Mrs. J. Hill, has taken charge of the Illinois hotel at Parma. Messrs. Orr and Kemp, photographers of Nampa, are in Nyssa for a location. Delmo Gibson will move his barber shop to the new Ennis building Nov. 1. 3c letter postage goes into effect Nov. 2. At a special election Saturday, Black Canyon settlers signified their approval of the plan of entering into a contract with the government for the watering of 39,000 acres of the Black Canyon project in the near future. Oregon Farmers Urged To Fill Out Crop Forms

Only a few days remain for Oregon farmers to return the special fall crop reports forms mailed to them earlier this month, according to Marion D. Thomas, market specialist at Oregon State college.

More than 14,000 farmers of the state received the forms Niels I. Nielsen of the crop reporting service in Portland, Thomas said. Many completed forms have been returned to Nielsen's office, he added, and the others should be mailed the next few days in order to be included in state averages.

Careful and prompt attention to the forms will benefit all Oregon agriculture, the OSC market specialist said. These findings will help Oregon farmers decide when to buy and sell and what to plant next year, he explained.

"It's money in the pocket for Oregon farmers to know where they fit into the nation's demand for farm goods," Thomas said. Totals for Oregon and other states will be available to all farmers and can be used to plan the farm business. Earlier estimates made this year

were based upon information obtained from trade people, county agents, farmers, and others who are familiar with local conditions, he pointed out. Now that harvest is nearly completed there is need for a more thorough check on what happened this year.

"Shifts in earlier crop plans or expected yields have probably changed the picture," the OSC specialist noted.

Thomas said that accurate reports are needed to supply farmers with necessary market information. He explained that "high estimates" can slow down trade and may cause low prices, and that "low estimates" can stimulate a false market and result in overproduction.

"We can be of best service to farmers when the estimates are based on a large number of individual farm reports," he said in urging farmers to mail the forms soon.

OSC Bulletin Gives Hog Housing Hints

Part of the high mortality of pigs farrowed is due to improper housing, according to a new bulletin issued by the Oregon State college extension service.

One way to insure a longer life for pigs, the bulletin points out, is to provide a hog house with good ventilation, maximum sunlight, warmth and dry conditions. Recommendations and explana-

tions are also made concerning the different types of hog houses and equipment. To aid the farmer in using the information, diagrams are included.

Entitled "Hog Houses and Equip-

ment," the bulletin was prepared by the departments of animal husbandry and agricultural engineering. Copies are now available from county extension offices or from the college.

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
