Game Hogs Leave 32 Birds Hidden

Vale—The sheriff's office here reported 32 slaughtered pheasants were found last Saturday near the Malheur river just south of the bridge on the highway leading east from Vale. Deputy Frank Eltering took the game birds to lockers where they were dressed and frozen to prevent spoilage.

Arrangements are being made to give half the illegally killed game birds to the Holy Rosary hospital in Ontario and the other half to the Malheur Memorial hospital in Nyssa. Signed complaints against trespassers are literally "rolling in" and are being processed in the various justice courts, the sheriff's office reported.

Deer Hides Bring \$57.50 for Polio

The Malheur Memorial hospital polio ward has an extra \$57.50 donated by deer hunters through Hopkins Wholesale Meat, which promoted the contributions of deer hides with all expenses borne by the packing firm.

H. O. Hopkins reported this week that the response to a request for deer hides, when the deer season opened, had been excellent. Deer hides were donated by successful hunters and were in turn sold by Hopkins and the revenue donated to the hospital polio ward.

This week Hopkins Wholesale Meat is requesting all hunters to take their elk hides to the plant which will handle all the details of selling them. Revenue from the elk hides will be turned over to the polio ward.

Hopkins expressed his thanks to the hunters who cooperated with the fund-making project.

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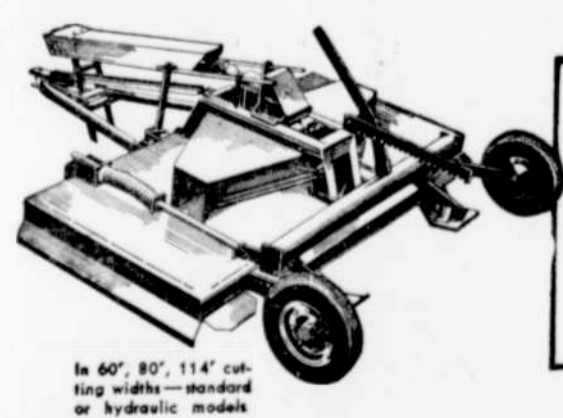
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
