Democratic CandidateJones' Reply To  
Campaign Quiz

Sam Coon and John G. Jones are competing to succeed Lowell Stockman as representative from Oregon's second congressional district in Washington, D. C. To clarify the issues, East Oregonian editor J. W. Forrester, Jr., submitted a list of twenty questions to the two candidates. Following are the questions and Jones' replies.

1. Are you in favor of continuing the multi-purpose dam construction program in the northwest, financing to be done by the federal government?
2. Are you in favor of the construction of four dams in the lower Snake river as proposed by the Corps of Army Engineers?
3. Are you in favor of construction of Hells Canyon dam by the federal government?
4. How would you propose that the vast phosphate deposits of Idaho be developed?
5. Are you in favor of giving individual stockmen perpetual grazing right on public lands?
6. Are you in favor of a price support program for agriculture? (Please define the operation of the program you favor.)
7. What type of farm program do you favor to cover perishable commodities?
8. Please explain fully your position on freight rates for western shippers—both rail and water.
9. Are you in favor of the present government program for making government-owned timber available to private operators?
10. Are you in favor of the proposed program by which the government would build access roads into its timber to make that timber available to both large and small lumber operators?
11. Are you in favor of federal aid to education? If not, how would you propose that underfinanced states take care of construction of school buildings and the education of some one million children not now attending schools?
12. The U. S. Supreme Court has ruled that tidelands oil belongs to the federal government. Do you agree or would you favor giving it to the state which it borders?
13. Are you in favor of expanding the benefits provided by the social security law to cover persons not now covered? (If not, please explain.)
14. Would you be in favor of any federal program to assure adequate medical care for those who cannot pay for it? (If not a federal program what would you favor?)
15. Are you in favor of federal legislation against discrimination in the employment of anyone because of race, color or creed to carry out the guarantees of our federal constitution?
16. Do you favor full support of the United Nations?
17. Are you in favor of reenacting legislation which covered the relocation of European displaced people in the United States?
18. Do you favor changing our present immigration laws? (If so, please define clearly.)
19. What is your thinking on the highly controversial tactics employed by Sen. Joseph McCarthy?
20. Are you in favor of the present program of aid to the western European nations? (If not, please explain.)

1. Yes. There is no other way that multi-purpose dam construction can be financed. As an investor in utility stocks I would not want my dollars to finance flood control and navigation which would bring me no return on my investment. I would want it used for power development which would bring me dividends. That is basically the reason the government of the United States must finance the great multi-purpose dams.

2. I favor the construction of the four dams in the lower Snake river as proposed by the Corps of Army Engineers.

3. I favor the construction of Hells Canyon dam by the federal government. A multiple-purpose dam is needed there if we are to realize the full potential of the Snake. As a rapidly growing nation we can keep faith with future generations only if we work for the full development of these resources. Where there is power only to be considered, the private utility should proceed with the construction. My position on this has been on public record as far back as the time of the first hearing on the 308 Report.

4. The vast phosphate deposits of Idaho can best be developed, and perhaps can only be developed, when there is available at or near the sight vast quantities of cheap hydro-electric power at rates comparable to those paid by aluminum plants in the Portland area.

5. I do not believe grazing rights should be perpetual. I don't favor a return to a system of medievalism and fiefs which would not be too different from a system of perpetual rights. There should be a fair and reasonable limit on all rights to federal property. I oppose any system that curtails the freedom of the individual in his attempt to compete with previously established enterprises.

6. I favor price supports for agriculture. Certainly we have experimented enough to know supports have freed farmers from many of the worries they once faced in the vagaries of seasons and markets. I think we should continue the present system of 90 per cent parity on basic commodities; we should continue marketing agreements where they have proved successful; and we should remember that generally food surpluses as a problem will be gone in a few years when our population reaches beyond a figure of 175 million.

7. Marketing agreements have been useful in connection with some of the perishable commodities. However, there are those in our own area who find the crops they raise have a dangerously high element of gamble in them, and a precious little element of security. The answer to this problem is not easy. If I could answer it, I couldn't begin to answer it in a paragraph. As long as we consider these perishable commodities a component part of the American standard of living, we should recognize that those who produce them have a right to expect some immediate attention toward securing those answers.

8. Our high freight rates in the west sentence us to a continuing position of being a colony of the East. Development of the navigation potential of the Columbia and its tributaries will do a great deal to correct this situation. Rails should not fear water transportation. Where the two compete, the competitive factor has usually stimulated the volume to such an extent that both will know a growing prosperity.

9. Yes. This is a program of wise cropping of a natural resource.

10. I think such a program would more than pay for itself, would be a great assist to the lumber operations of the country. It should not eliminate the small operator, but it should encourage all those buying government timber to make the fullest utilization of the resources.

11. All people who believe in our present system of American education believe in federal aid to education. We've had such aid for over 100 years. It has taken many different forms. What most of us fear is not federal aid but federal control. There must be further and additional federal aid for those states so under-financed they cannot support an adequate system of education. When federal projects like McNary dam create problems of overcrowding of facilities, it is im-

perative that federal aid be given.

12. I willingly accept the decision of the supreme court. Furthermore, I favor the Hill amendment on tidelands oil which makes a great share of that wealth available to needy school districts. Tidelands is a poor term. It really is beyond tidelands that the controversy is over.

13. I think that everyone should come under the provisions of the social security law.

14. When the question is asked: "Would you be in favor of any federal program to assure adequate medical care for those who cannot pay for it?" I am inclined to answer that this is not the problem. The problem, I believe, is the great middle income group whose financial security is washed away by a steady downpour of chronic ill health or a flash-flood of accidents and acute sickness. The insurance they buy from private companies proves less and less adequate as rates increase reflecting the rising costs of doctor and hospital fees. I think the doctors themselves must provide us with the solution to this problem. Their organized opposition to the proposals for federal insurance demonstrated the ability of the doctors to work together. I'm sure an equal expenditure of money and effort by them in a study of this problem would produce an effective answer. If the doctors refuse to face it realistically and are unable to come to grips with this problem, then it should next be considered at the state level of government. Personally, I abhor any system that does not allow the individual to choose his own physician.

15. Yes. It is working well in the state of Oregon where we have had such a law in operation for the past few years. I'm sure it would strike the authors of the constitution as ridiculous that we have to pass a law to assure something so explicitly written into that document. If that is what it takes to guarantee it, then we can't save our face in the world of nations much longer without passing such a law. The fact that such a law is needed indicts us as a nation of hypocrites.

16. We must give full support to the United Nations. We must not let it become a senile organization like the late League of Nations. Though an imperfect instrument, the United Nations offers the best hope of man to gain some unity of action in a troubled world.

17. The original legislation only partly solved the problem presented by the European displaced persons. Further legislation must be enacted. Having worked with these people of Europe I have some very definite ideas on what needs to be done. Time does not allow my covering that need here.

18. Yes. The replacement of our old vicious laws by an equally vicious McCarran act reminds me of the man who quit beating his wife and turned his blows on his mother-in-law. The old law did great injustice to the Japanese and other orientals. Today's law strikes at the people of India. Replacing one stupidity with another stupidity doesn't total up as common sense. We need a new law that is just and equitable and that is not written in a spirit of vindictiveness.

19. The tactics of Senator McCarthy do violence to all the basic American instincts. The true test of patriotism and the true bulwark against communism lies in defending our free institutions and great traditions wherever they are threatened, not in surrendering them in the name of a cause. We cannot fight communism by adopting communist tactics. Let's not contract the disease we are trying to cure.

20. Yes. I favor present program of aid to the nations of western Europe. Many aspects of this aid have been inadequately reported or ignored entirely. At the present moment Don Sloan of Portland is in Europe with seven other experts on finance, production, salesmanship and advertising. These experts, as a phase of our government aid, are bringing to cartel-minded Europe the story and understanding of the dynamics of the American competitive system . . . a system which believes in expanding and creating markets, which believes in looking for new and better methods rather than clinging desperately to old machines and older methods.
