

Bulldogs Meet Payette Here Friday; Game Originally Scheduled Nov. 11

An injury-ridden Nyssa high school football team will meet the scrappy and unpredictable Payette Pirates on the Bulldog field at 2:15 p. m. Friday in a game that can spell Nyssa's fate in the Snake River Valley Class A league.

It became necessary to advance the date of the game, originally scheduled here as the Armistice Day game Nov. 11, when the Pirate's defeat of the Vale Vikings threw the schedule into a cocked hat.

The Bulldogs will be without the services of their stellar quarterback, Dan Lovejoy, who has been the team's mainstay all season. Lovejoy received a broken collarbone during the second quarter of the Nyssa-Meridian game at Meridian last week. His loss to the team for most of the game undoubtedly spelled the difference between victory and the 13-13 tie the Bulldogs had to settle for.

The Bulldogs go into their final league game Friday in third place in league standings. A win would tie them with Vale, at least temporarily for the Vikings meets Ontario on the Tiger field Friday evening.

A Vale win would make the Vik-

ings undisputed league champions, leaving the Bulldogs in second spot and Payette in third—that is, if Nyssa wins Friday.
