10 Years Ago Nov. 5, 1942

Unofficial tabulations show that Grant Rinehart was elected city recorder by a slim margin over M. F. Solomon in the only hotly contested race in the city election held Tuesday. Bernard Frost, George Henneman, G. M. Sallee and R. H. Whitaker were elected councilmen.—Miss Erma Hamlin of LaGrande was purchased Ruth's Beauty Nook from Mrs. Ruth Bodmer.—Bernard Frost, Artie Robertson, Pud Long, Dr. E. D. Norcott, Charles Newbill and Frank Newbill each killed an elk in the Anthony Lakes area. 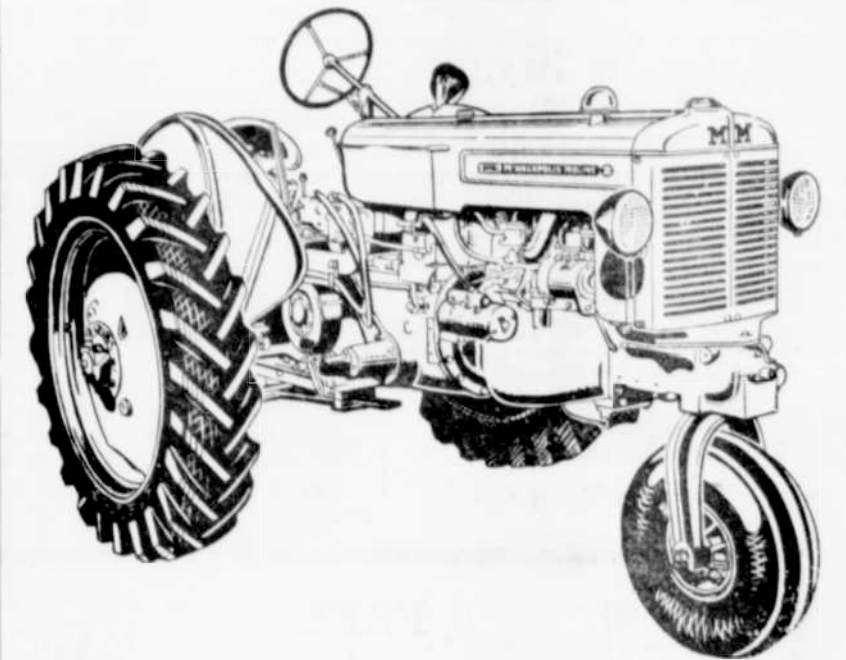

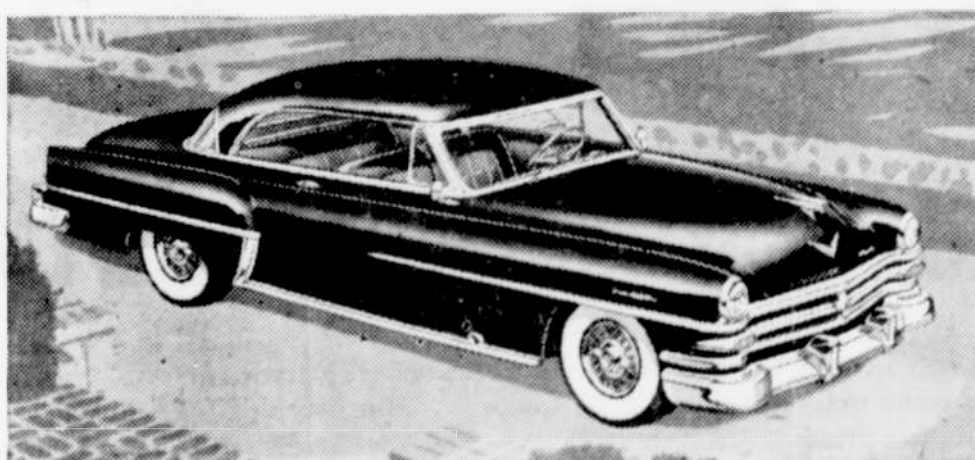
