Malheur County Gets Top Share Federal Funds

Malheur county received the largest sum of two federal apportionments to Oregon counties through disbursements made by the Oregon secretary of state's office, it was announced last week.

This county received \$5,428.46 for the largest single amount from the distribution of receipts from rental of federal grazing lands as provided under the Taylor Grazing act. The

total sum, not revealed by the secretary of state's office, went to 21 eastern Oregon counties in seven U. S. grazing districts and are receipts from 12,603,988 acres of grazing land. Some of the money being apportioned is in the form of leases which goes to some counties not in the grazing district, it was explained. The apportionment is for the 1952 fiscal year.

Malheur received \$5,329.50 from mineral lease receipts apportioned for the first half of 1952. A total of \$9,367.50 was disbursed to six counties and are to be used for public roads or schools in the counties.
