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The Nyssa Area Is Growing

No one but the gloomiest of pessimists can deny that the growth of Nyssa and its surrounding trade area is a healthy one. That fact is substantiated by the mounting varieties of farm crop shipments that leave the Union Pacific terminal here each month.

While the increased volume of carloadings is indeed gratifying, the diversity of the crops grown is becoming more and more obvious each time shipping reports are released by Tom Jones, the U. P. agent. Many of us can remember when Nyssa was "just another small town" with ambitions not unlike those of every other western community that built their hopes and dreams of the future on the migration of people from the east and mid-west. The Owyhee project and the Amalgamated sugar factory are two factors that gave Nyssa a terrific advantage over the average town in the intermountain area.

While the Owyhee project is by no means an old established farming area, most of the farms there have been in production for 20 years or more to assure their economic soundness. The fact that a vast majority of the farms are owned and operated by the people who are making their homes there is added proof of this area's economic stability.

The farms surrounding Nyssa are totally responsible for the population of the town and indications are that both the rural and urban populations are growing. They are growing in two ways—more people are coming to this area and more and more residents of the farming

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communities are making Nyssa their trading headquarters.

This week the Journal had the unexpected satisfaction of learning that approximately 300 new subscribers have been added to its "family" during a three-weeks' subscription drive to bring the total readers to 8,500 in this trade area alone. Those people are most certainly interested in Nyssa and the surrounding rural communities.

Whether they are newcomers to the area, or older residents now getting closer ties with Nyssa, we welcome them and will enjoy the weekly "visitations" just as we have those subscribers who have been reading the Journal for many years.
