Veterinarians to Test Beef Cattle For Tuberculosis

Two federal veterinarians will start testing beef cattle for tuberculosis in Malheur county next Monday, according to information received from Dr. Robert Mowrer, resident representative of the Bureau of Animal Industries and county veterinarian.

Mowrer said that the two men have been assigned to work in Malheur county in line with the re-

quest made by the disease control committee at the recent meeting of the Malheur County Livestock Association. Dr. A. S. Beagle, veterinarian in charge of the Portland division, advised Mowrer that Dr. L. L. Taylor of The Dalles, and Dr. Gordon Blake from Pendleton, have been assigned to work on this project.

The testing program will be similar to the one carried on during the winter of 1950 when some 7000 beef cattle were tested to re-establish Malheur county's tuberculosis accreditation.

Harry Sandquist, Malheur county agent, said that the county had lost the accreditation for a period prior to 1950. Livestock producers found that their animals could not enter some areas without being tested. This resulted in limiting the markets for cattle produced here and caused expensive delays for testing. The project to re-accredit the county was sponsored by the Malheur County Livestock association three years ago.

The three year accreditation issued to the county by the state and federal authorities will expire in March. Sandquist said it will be necessary to have enough cows tested before that date to avoid losing the rating.

Members of the livestock association are working under the direction of their president, Bert Hawkins to make arrangements for the testing program. They are contacting producers to arrange schedules for the veterinarians. Dr. Mowrer explained that it will be necessary to test ten percent of the beef cattle. Herds in all sections of the county will be tested to get a true representative sample. Only mature animals will be tested, because of the fact that tuberculosis rarely occurs in young animals, Mowrer concluded.
