

Range Handbook Facts Available

Useful handbooks on range management, planning a house, and radio, mingle with books of fact and fiction in the weekly group of new books at the Malheur County Library. These titles will go into circulation on Saturday, Jan. 10.

"Last Voyage" by Ann Davidson is the absorbing account of the adventures of a courageous couple which culminated in an illicit and ultimately disastrous voyage with the ketch Reliance.

A novel about the healing effects of a pack trip into the Great Smokies on the personal lives of several people quietly told by Elizabeth Yates in "Brave Interval."

"Visa to Moscow" is an informative report by a French newspaper correspondent, Michel Gorday, of his impressions of the Russian people, their customs and attitudes, observed in a sixty-three-day visit to the Soviet Union during the Cold War.

Based upon incidents in the life of the abolitionist preacher, Theodore Parker, the novel "Sin of the Prophet" by Truman Nelson tells the story of the legal fight for the escaped slave, Anthony Burns, in the decade preceding the Civil War.

"SPQR," the title of a sophisticated novel by Paul Bonner, stands for the brand of ancient Rome which labelled the city's property. Lovat Fraser of the American Embassy there becomes the city's captive himself when he is involved in affairs with two women in Rome.

Elizabeth Spencer writes a story of the Mississippi hills and Delta country centered around the character of Amos Dudley who settled there in the early 1900's, "This Crooked Way."

Children Love Orange Juice, Chockfull of Vitamin C

DEFICIENCY IN VITAMIN C is one of the easiest of the vitamin deficiencies to avoid in children. Here are some suggestions for school-box lunches with quick-frozen orange juice:

Cream cheese on raisin bread sandwich, sliced meat sandwich on whole wheat or enriched bread, orange juice and cookies; chopped egg on whole wheat bread sandwich, stalk of celery stuffed with cottage cheese, sponge cupcake and orange juice; meat loaf sandwich on white bread, jelly and peanut butter sandwich, orange juice. A banana may be added if a hearty menu is desired. The new Birds Eye orange juice can be reconstituted with the family breakfast quota or, if it is more convenient to do so, the night before, for it retains flavor and vitamins, if kept refrigerated, for as long as seventy-two hours.

In some of the lunch-box menus, two sandwiches are suggested. These will give the older child a really substantial lunch. Two half sandwiches with different fillings—each made with one slice of bread cut in two—will give the smaller child, with a naturally smaller appetite, tempting variety.
