He will drive his car, which the government permitted him to take to Europe, and will investigate relatives of the Harm Folkerts, 103 East Third St., Nyssa, and William Holt, 104 East Third St., former residents of Holland.

Dressed in native garb, the Folkert and Holt families, members of the L. D. S. church, will participate in the Sunday evening services by singing hymns, solos and duets in their native Dutch self-accompanied on the violin, harmonica, organ and banjo.

Offerings received will be sent to the Rev. Maxfield through the "Week of Compassion" headquarters of the Christian church at Indianapolis, Ind.
