 Eugene Stephen home.

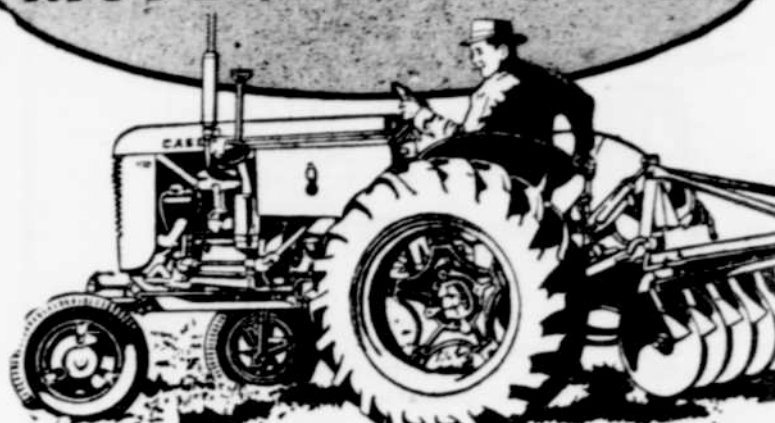
Mrs. Alva Goodell entertained the
