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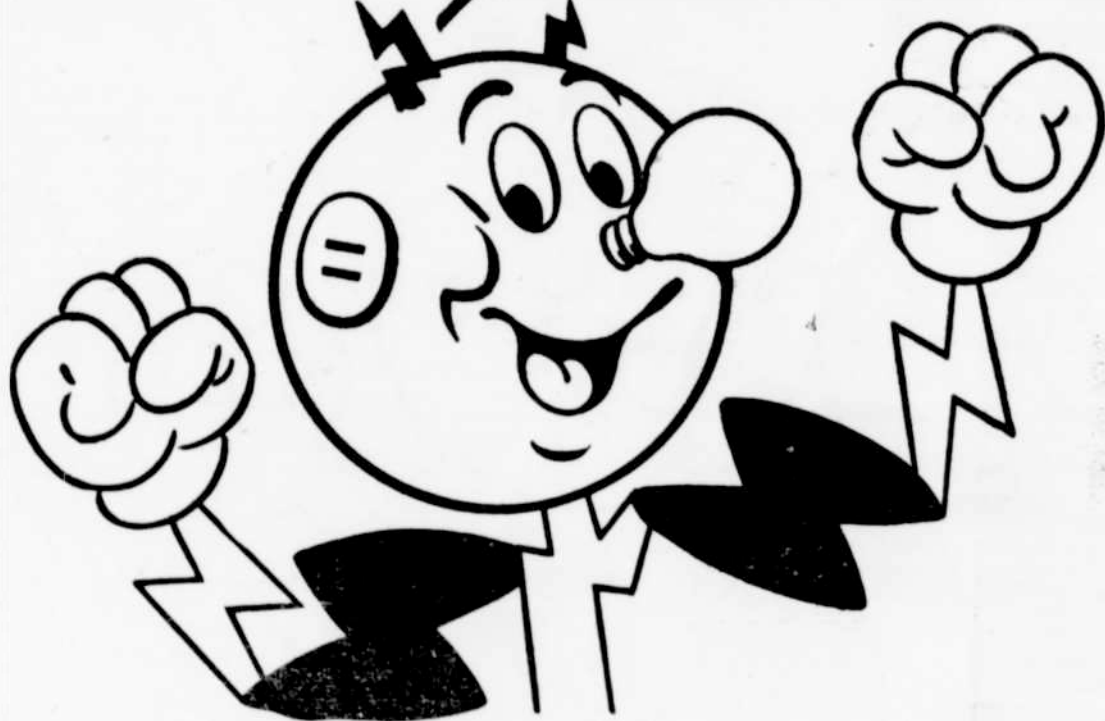
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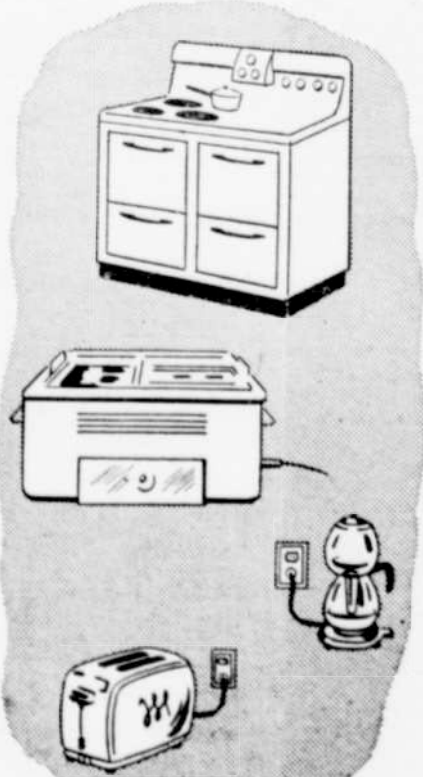
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QUESTION: Although our home is worth \$10,000, we've always carried only \$5,000 fire insurance as we felt any fire damage would certainly be lower than that amount. Now a friend says that if we had a \$1,000 fire we would only get \$500 from the Insurance Company. Is this true?

ANSWER: Not unless yours is a very unusual policy. Your friend is referring to a Co-Insurance Clause which is seldom used in writing insurance on a dwelling. However you should immediately consult a good insurance agent about adequate protection. Your fire insurance should always be kept at the amount it would cost you to replace your home.
