Days Gone By in Nyssa Community

From the Journal Files

5 Years Ago Aug. 5, 1948

Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Lemon have erected a new hatchery building on highway 20 one and one-half miles north of Nyssa. Jim Kimmell of Ontario has purchased the Signal service station at Third and Main from LeRoy Bibbey. J. H. Wise and son of Boise have been awarded the contract to build the new Union Pacific freight depot at Nyssa. Wise bid \$31,340 on the depot job. An estimated 8,000 acres of range land was burned over Saturday and Sunday in the Vale section. The fire, caused by lightning, started during an electric and wind storm that swept Malheur county Saturday evening. Nyssa Boat club members won all except one of the trophies given to winners in the boat carnival held on Wallowa Lake Sunday in conjunction with the Chief Joseph days celebration. Winners from Nyssa, in the race were Muriel Marcum, Dale Garrison, Howard Bybee, Dr. L. A. Maudling, Ray Bybee, and Sandy Patterson.

10 Years Ago, Aug. 5, 1938

Reduced sugar beet acreage will compel the Amalgamated Sugar Co. to close its factories at Nampa, Burley and Rupert, company officials announced. The Nyssa plant will handle all beets grown in the Nyssa-Nampa district and beets from Burley and Rupert will be processed at Twin Falls. Poets of Nyssa and surrounding communities will meet at the home of Carol Bybee to organize a poets of Nyssa club. Encouragement has been given by the war production board to further the development of calcite deposits of optical grade located near the Owyhee reservoir in Malheur county.

15 Years Ago, Aug. 4, 1923

Frank Phillips who last week opened the Drive-In Market on highway 30 north of the "Y" under the name of "The Owyhee Drive In Market" has changed it to the "Phillips Drive-In Market." An announcement was made this week that the Nyssa branch of the First National Bank of Portland will move into its new quarters Saturday of this week, being ready for business Monday, Aug. 8, according to George Mitchell, manager. Under the sponsorship to Mrs. C. L. McCoy and Mrs. Kenneth Cottle six of Nyssa's fairest have come to be called "Sugar Babies." Six girls, Misses Floy Byram, Zeola Benton, Viola Pullen, Dorothy Jensen, Irene Poage, and Marilyn Cottle were chosen to represent Nyssa in a pageant of pictures telling of the activities of the Amalgamated Beet Sugar Co. in Nyssa. Congressman Walter M. Pierce was a visitor in Nyssa Friday, was shown through the sugar factory, attended a school board meeting, discussed problems with Postmaster S. D. Goshert and was among luncheon guests of Mr. and Mrs. Frank T. Morgan.

20 Years Ago Aug. 3, 1933

Pedro Tensen and Robt. Gillett are tossing their hats into the ring by planting 32 acres of summer lettuce. Jake Fisher raised a crop of early potatoes that proved to be a mortgage lifter. Five acres yielded two full cars at \$1.75 per hundred. Bernard Frost improved his home by the addition of a glassed-in sleeping porch. A thief broke into the dental office of Dr. E. D. Norcott and made away with his entire supply of gold amounting to about \$30. T. E. Navy Recruiter Writes Praise of Judge D. Graham

A feature article paying tribute to Don M. Graham of Nyssa appeared in the August issue of Salt Lake Recruiter, monthly publication of the U. S. Navy recruiting station and office of naval officer procurement at Salt Lake.

Written by J. E. Blacksmith, the article stated that Don Wilder, who makes a bi-monthly trip to Nyssa is probably the most fortunate recruiter in the entire recruiting service because of his regular stop and recruiting station is the office of Judge Graham, gunner's mate first class, U. S. Naval reserve.

The writer calls attention to his office Navy posters, Graham's picture sporting 17 service ribbons and his letter from the commandant of the 13th Naval district proclaiming him as a steady reserve.

The article recalls that Graham settled in Oregon in 1904, coming here from Scotland where he was born Oct. 18, 1892. He served in the British army in World War I, in the U. S. Navy in World War II and returned to active duty in 1951 to serve 14 months during the Korean war.

"It is through the efforts of men like Don M. Graham whose devotion to duty makes our Navy the greatest Navy in the world," the article concluded.

In addition to the paving, there will be 16,040 lineal feet of frontage curbing and 2,184 lineal feet of intersection curbing.

Further Water Study
A partial study of means to improve the domestic water supply, which also serves as an irrigation system, was reported by Councilman Clifford Mink. Numerous proposals have been made as a means to obtain additional water, but limited finances have prevented a complete survey. Mink's committee recommended that no increases be made in water charges until an adequate supply of water is available for users.

The council instructed Mink and Emil Stunz to continue a study of the water situation for more detailed reports to the city manager and the council.

A motion of the council instructed the police department to notify all tavern owners and operators to keep the back doors of taverns locked at all times.

At the request of the rural fire department board, the city renewed for another year a contract for the city to house and man rural fire equipment in exchange for the city's privilege of use of the equipment in the city when needed.

The draft of an ordinance prepared by City Attorney Harold Henson and Councilmen Bob Thompson and Dale Bingham for the regulation of the operation of bicycles was approved and will be read for the first time at the September meeting.
