Tourist Traffic Pattern

A survey party for the Oregon State Highway Commission checked eastbound, out-of-state autos at the Cairo junction Monday. Members of the party gave an interested Ontario person the following breakdown on the autos stopped:

Hold Officers'
Training Friday

Malheur county extension units will start their fall activities Tuesday with an officers' training day at the United Presbyterian church in Ontario from 10:30 a. m. to 3:30 p. m., according to Mrs. Edna Mae Wimsatt, county extension agent in home economics.

The year's program officially got underway, Aug. 4, with installation of new officers for each of the 13 county units and the Malheur county committee members. The installation was held at Mrs. George Lang's Vale.

Mrs. Wimsatt says the home economics county committee is planning a model business meeting for its Tuesday session, which will be open to officers of all units and county committee members. Miss Viola Hansen, state agent from Oregon State college, will discuss the state program for the coming year.

The unit and county objectives for the coming year and will act on recommendations set forth by the state council at its annual meeting in Corvallis in June.

The county home agent will outline project work for the coming year. This will include home canned and frozen foods in meals, accessories for clothing, interior wall finishes, getting the most use from small electrical equipment, matching plaids and strips, creative embroidery, and buying and using synthetic detergents.

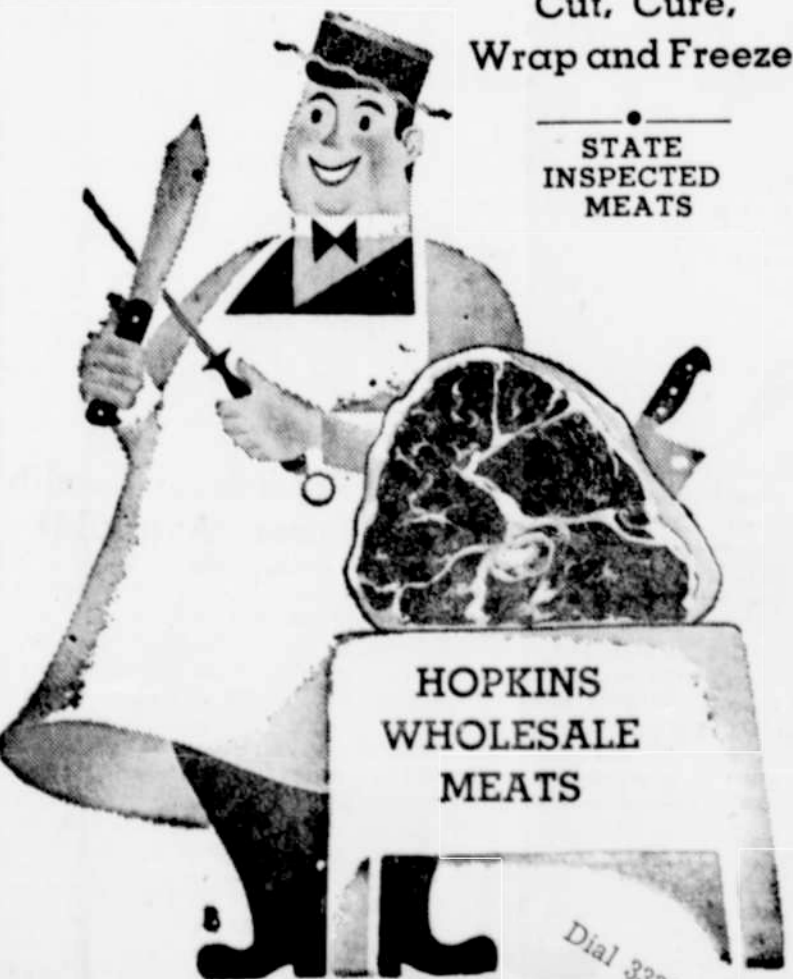
