

Post Office Has 1953 Duck Stamps

Migratory waterfowl stamps, commonly referred to as "Duck Stamps," are now available at U. S. post offices. The 1953 stamp is maroon and depicts a blue-winged teal. All migratory waterfowl hunters over the age of 16 are required to have one of the stamps in their possession while duck hunting. The cost is two dollars.

Oregon's duck season begins at noon on Oct. 17 and extends through Dec. 30. Daily shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Printed synopses of the waterfowl regulations will be available for distribution shortly after Oct. 1.

Bulldogs Score 19-12 Victory Over John Day; Tanner Out for Season

On the long end of a 19-12 victory in a non-conference football game here last Friday, Nyssa's Bulldogs displayed their best form of the season against a weaker John Day eleven.

The win was a costly one for Coach Howard Lovejoy, however, who has lost the services of his most experienced player, Junius Tanner, for the rest of the season.

Tanner sustained a broken ankle when tackled in the early part of the third quarter. He paved the way for victory, however, before leaving the game with several long-gain runs, including a 17-yard touchdown dash round end in the first quarter.

Red Holcomb, who made long gains before leaving the game in the third quarter because of injuries, kicked the extra point for the only such of the game.

Most spectacular play of the game was a 60-yard punt by Tanner in the first quarter that went into the end zone for a safety. It was the Bulldogs' only punt of the evening.

In the second quarter Holcomb scored from the 5-yard line in an off-tackle plunge.

Nyssa's final touchdown was made in the fourth quarter by Danny Giron, who replaced Tanner at right halfback, on a 10-yard end-around play. Giron made a number of long runs, almost getting in the clear several times.

John Day's two TD's, one each in the third and fourth periods, were both made by Chris Baugz, quarterback.

Off-side penalties cost the Bulldogs three extra touchdowns, one by Tanner over guard for 35 yards in the second quarter and one each by Dave Hartley and Giron in the third period, both on passes. Nyssa lost 40 yards due to penalties as against 35 lost by John Day.

In only one department did John Day best Nyssa, and that was in completing one pass out of eight attempts, for a 15-yard gain. On the other hand, Holcomb made the only pass interception. The Bulldogs

Juvenile Chink Hunting Results Reported Low

Juvenile pheasant hunters taking part in the first week-end of the open season in the E. E. Wilson Game Management Area reported more difficulty in getting their birds than did the hunters last year.

Don Kirkpatrick, in charge of the area game commission, blames the slightly lower success on the heavy cover and late hatches of birds. The long wet spring can be credited with bringing about both of the hindrances.

The heavy cover is making it extremely difficult to find the birds and Kirkpatrick points out that a dog, whether he be bird dog or not, is a great help in stirring up the secretive "chinks."

In addition to having trouble finding the birds, many of the youthful hunters are having problems trying to tell the rooster from the hen. Many of the birds which were hatched late have come forth with their full coat of colors as yet and juvenile hunters have been showing good sportsmanship in letting doubtful birds go without shooting at them.

Kirkpatrick sums up the situation with, "Hunting will probably improve as time goes by since more of the pheasants will get their adult colors, but even now, most of the hunters who really hunted managed to get their two birds."

A maximum of 35 permits per day is issued to youngsters holding juvenile hunting license. At present, there are many permits still available for open days in the latter part of October and the scheduled days in November. The open days are listed in the 1953 hunting regulations booklet.

Warning to Hunters With Weak Hearts

A pre-hunting season warning issued to the hunters of California by their game department is one that the hunters of Oregon would do well to heed.

With more than 200,000 hunters going afield in search of the various game birds of the state, a few timely suggestions have been put forth. These suggestions are for hunters as an aid in preventing serious ill effects from over exertion.

1. Act your age and know your physical limits.

2. Avoid vigorous hill climbs and difficult drives if aware of a heart condition.

3. Do not hunt to the limit of your endurance.

4. Be alert for shortness of breath or pain in the chest as warning of over exertion.

5. Attempt to condition yourself for the opening day by frequent hikes several weeks in advance of the first hunting day.

Oregon had a number of deaths last year attributed to over-exertion during the hunting season, and it is hoped that hunters will protect themselves by heeding the above suggestions.

Bonfire Rally; Snake Dance Set For 7:30 Tonight

The snake dance will be led by the cheer leaders and band majorettes, with the high school band playing the marching music.

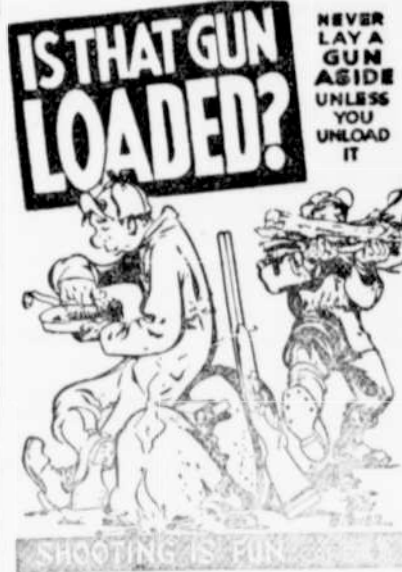
