

### Plans Complete For Jersey Sale On Saturday

The start of all-Jersey milk distribution in Idaho and its anticipated spread into neighboring areas automatically calls for more Jersey cows in eastern Oregon and western Idaho, and the fourth annual Jersey heifer investment sale, to be held on the Malheur county fairgrounds, Ontario, Saturday, Oct. 10, will help to fill that demand, according to Neal W. Miller, Woodburn, president, Oregon Jersey Cattle club, sponsor of the sale.  
The catalog lists 17 of the 32 pedigreed Jersey heifers to be sold at that time as bred, some due for early freshening. The other and younger animals will be sold open so they may be bred to their new owner's bulls. Production records of dams of the heifers to be offered in this sale up to well over 600 pounds fat, actual, for 305-day lactations, with milk production of 10,000 pounds and over. Many of the best known sires in Oregon's nationally famous Jersey herds are represented in the pedigrees of the sale heifers.  
The animals arrived at the fairgrounds earlier this week and may now be inspected by potential purchasers. Lunch may be procured prior to the sale Saturday, and the auctioning is scheduled to begin promptly at 1 p. m., with Harvey Christiansen, Wapato, Wash., crying the sale.  
Sale manager Newton Davis, Woodburn, arrived in Ontario Thursday to personally supervise last minute details.  
Attention is directed to the pre-sale no-host banquet for sellers, buyers and all others interested in Jersey cattle to be held at 7:30 p. m. Friday in the East Side club, Ontario. A special program has been


