Lions District Governor Makes Visit to Nyssa
Jay Merrill of Twin Falls, Ida., governor of Lions district 39-W, was a Nyssa visitor Monday and was the speaker at the Nyssa Lions club at its noon meeting.

He was introduced by P. R. Mortimer, Lions zone chairman visiting from Ontario.

Merrill reminded Lions club members that in the 35 years of its existence Lions International had grown to such proportions that "the sun never sets on Lionism."

Theme of Merrill's visitation message was based on the basic principles of the Lions organization.

Merrill particularly stressed three points: personal integrity, codes of honor in business and faith.

An apt quotable statement by Merrill pertaining to personal integrity was: "No matter how you arrange bad eggs, you can't make a good omelet."

In commenting on the need for codes of ethics among business men, the speaker cited what Florence Nightingale did during the Crimean War to give the nursing profession a code of ethics.

"The time is now here," Merrill emphasized, "to put the full weight of our influence behind the principles of Lionism."

South Africa's dismal waste lands, primitive methods of living and the work of Christian missionaries were graphically and interestingly detailed to members of the Lions club Oct. 5 by the Rev. Robert O. Jackson, who spent five years as a medical missionary in Swaziland, with a series of colored slides.

The Rev. Jackson returned from the South African mission field two years ago. He is now pastor of the Nyssa Church of the Nazarene.

Pictures shown by the Rev. Jackson showed the primitive conditions under which the natives live and the efforts of missionaries to better them with maintenance of schools and hospitals.
