 Dorothy Roberts.

 ancestors of the Ellises who appeared

 novel is A Fair Wind Home.

An evaluation of a contemporary
 literary form is made by Ray B.
 West in The Short Story in America.

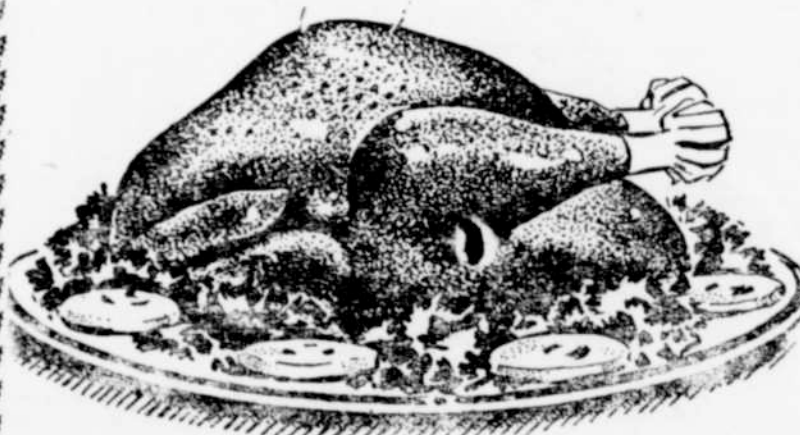
