Chocolate Pudding
3 tablespoons cornstarch 2 cups skim milk
3 tablespoons cocoa 1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 teaspoon salt 1 Dash cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon Sweets

Mix cornstarch, cocoa and salt with 1/4 cup of milk until smooth. Meanwhile scald the remaining milk in double boiler. Pour a little of the scalded milk into the cornstarch mixture and blend smooth. Stir this slowly into remaining scalded milk, then cook, stirring constantly, until the pudding is thick and smooth. Cover the double boiler and cook 20 minutes. Stir occasionally. Cool slightly, then add Sweets and vanilla, stirring in well. Cover and allow pudding to chill. Arrange with white topping in sherbet or parfait glasses.

White Topping
1/2 cup cold water 1/4 Dash almond extract
1 tablespoon lemon juice 1/4 teaspoon Sweets
1/2 cup nonfat dry milk solids

Place water in bowl. Add lemon juice, Sweets, almond extract and milk solids. Beat with rotary beater or electric mixer until thick as marshmallow fluff. This topping will stay light and fluffy for about 30 minutes.

Local Stockmen To Attend OSC Livestock Meet

Oregon's livestock and meat marketing will be examined from all angles by the people in the industry Jan. 6 and 7 at Oregon State college. Several stockmen and other interested in livestock production and marketing plan to attend from Malheur county according to George Bain, county extension agent.

OSC's extension service is sponsoring the marketing conference to develop a better working relationship among all segments in the industry from producer to consumer. The conference was scheduled in response to a recommendation of the state agricultural and rural life planning conference in March, 1952.

Six committees, representing phases of the industry, have worked out reports on their services and recommendations for improving meat marketing.

Walter Holt of Portland is general chairman of the two-day conference, and Edward Coles, extension livestock marketing specialist, is heading over-all plans.

Group chairmen are Mrs. Jack Sugg, Portland consumers; William Southworth, Seneca, and Charles Swango, Eugene, producers; Prosser Clark, Portland, and Ellis White, Ontario, marketing agencies; Harold Kummer, Hillsboro, packers; Claude Hall, Waldport, and B. E. Dain, Portland, retailers; and H. E. Barker, Salem, labor.

Keynote speaker for the conference will be Reuben Albaugh, California extension livestock specialist, who will discuss changes in Pacific Coast Livestock marketing of recent years.

Max O. Cullen, former LaGrande retailer who is director of the National Livestock and Meat board department of meat merchandising, is to demonstrate new ways with meat through modern cutting and cooking methods. His lecture will be Jan. 7 at 9 a. m.

The public is invited to general sessions and to forum meetings of the participating groups.
