YMCA Committee Seeks Funds For Hi-Y Activities

An annual drive to raise funds for Hi-Y clubs through the Nyssa YMCA committee got underway last week with an appeal for sufficient contributions to raise \$300, it was announced by E. A. "Gus" Liming, chairman of the committee.

The Nyssa club is made up of high school boys under the leadership of Charles W. Steffens, high school faculty member. It is one of 80 such high school clubs of the YMCA of Oregon and 20 of them are fostered by local adult committees like the one here. They receive staff assistance from the Pacific Northwest area council of YMCAs for guidance and counsel.

Nyssa Hi-Y club officers met last September with those of other clubs of eastern Oregon and southwest Idaho for officer training. In February the elected representatives met at Baker for a pre-legislative conference and in Salem at the youth legislature.

National purpose of all Hi-Y clubs is to create, maintain and extend throughout the home, school and community, high standards of Christian character.

Of the \$300 quota set, \$100 is needed for local expense and \$200 is Nyssa's share of staff and headquarters services of the Pacific Northwest area council of YMCAs.

Other members of the local committee are the Rev. John Briel, Wayne C. Chesnut, J. L. Herriman, Raymond A. Larson, Howard Lovejoy, Charles W. Steffens, the Rev. V. L. Taylor, Dick Tensen and R. V. Wilson.

Prize Winners At November Corn Show Revealed

Several Nyssa area and Malheur county farmers and farm youths received prizes at the 12th annual Oregon state corn show held at Hermiston Nov. 27 and 28, it was announced Tuesday by the county agent's office.

In the open class for eastern Oregon, Wayne Garner won third place for hybrid corn, Irwin Durfee rated third and Damon Savage won eighth place.

In the FFA section five Malheur county youths made better than average with their hybrid corn. Second through sixth place in that order were Donald Hohstadt, Ontario; Dave Savage and V. L. Kessler, all of Nyssa, and George Jelinek, Adrian.

The Moeller youths took the first four honors in the open class for 10-ear exhibits for district 4. Rating first through fourth in that order were Jean, Joretta, August and George Moeller, who live between Nyssa and Ontario.

Johnny Thiel, Adrian, won first place in the FFA 10-ear exhibit for Malheur county. Second through eighth place winners were Don Oizund, Jess Jackson, Melvin May, Don Hohstadt, Ralph Barker, Gary Winegar and Harold Amidon, all of the Ontario chapter.

Melvin Ballantyne, Nyssa, won fourth place in the FFA judging contest and Eugene Maw was awarded seventh place.

Hay Shipments To Drouth Sections

Hay shipments from eastern Oregon to drouth areas are expected to start again after an embargo was imposed for a short period of time because of the congestion of shipments in Missouri.

W. K. Wahlert, manager of the Dessert Seed Co. which has been making large shipments from various points in eastern Oregon including Nyssa, stated that hay is still badly needed in the drouth areas of the southwest. Shipments were being received from all parts of the United States and it was impossible to handle the hay at receiving points when several dozen cars would arrive at the same time.

The Dessert Seed Co. has shipped about 250 cars of hay from Nyssa and nearly 500 cars from the area in which the hay is being purchased by the Nyssa firm.
