Attention Sugar Beet Growers

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has imposed marketing allotments on all beet sugar processors for 1954. As a result acreage restrictions are necessary. Therefore, farmers wishing to grow beets this year must apply for an acreage allotment. Most sugar beet growers have already made their request for acreage. To those who have not yet requested an acreage for this year, they should make their request at the Nyssa, Oregon or Nampa, Idaho office of The Amalgamated Sugar Company or with the Sugar Company fieldman in your area. Requests for beet acreage must be made by not later than February 1, 1954, as after this date acreage requests can not be considered. Remember, the deadline is February 1, 1954.
