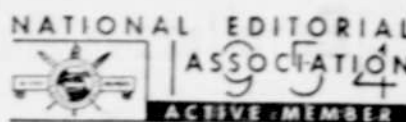

How About A Glass of Milk?

"Everybody talks about it but nobody does anything about it," originally applied to the weather, but Mark Twain's adage can be easily fitted to the current controversy about the high price of coffee and the surplus of dairy products.

It would be surprising how much milk could be consumed if coffee drinkers would remember to order milk during those mid-morning and mid-afternoon coffee breaks. This newspaper made such a suggestion about a year ago, but the Chamber of Commerce and various dairy groups failed to respond.

In at least one dairy section of Oregon, all restaurants have huge vats for the purpose of dispensing milk by the glass. We were told that dairy associations had promoted the idea and helped finance the special facilities which more than paid off in the increased consumption of the native product.

It would be easy to form the habit of ordering a glass of milk at the lunch counter and there's no doubt that the refreshment would be more nourishing. If milk replaced coffee in Nyssa for the twice-a-day respite from work, hundreds of gallons of additional milk would be consumed, the restaurants and lunch counters would make as much or more profit and the idea would spread to other farming communities.

Such a project would require some promotion on the part of the Chamber and dairy groups. The public is in the habit of responding to such promotions and in Nyssa the record speaks for itself as is evidenced by all the "first" to the community's credit.
