20 Years Ago Feb. 15, 1934

These classes will be taught by unemployed teachers, and they would be paid by funds from the CWA.

25 Years Ago—Feb. 22, 1929

H. Henderson in charge. — The General Construction Co. has started a cableway from one side of the Owyhee dam canyon to the other. The cable system will be the largest ever constructed west of the Mississippi river. The gasoline coach to be run from Dunaway to the dam has arrived at the dam. It will make daily trips and seats 42 people.

30 Years Ago—Feb. 15, 1924
