

Easter Seal Sale Opens Today In Malheur County

The 1954 Easter Seal campaign of the Oregon Society for Crippled Children and Adults opened today throughout Malheur county.

The sale will continue through Easter Sunday, April 18, according to Mr. and Mrs. Dick Taylor, chairmen for Malheur county.

A total of 5,552 Easter Seal letters will be mailed in Malheur county during the next few days. The mailing for the entire state will be approximately 450,000 letters.

Mr. and Mrs. Taylor expressed hope that Malheur county "will respond generously so that the many services the society provides for the state's crippled children and adults can continue and possibly expand."

The sale of Easter Seals provides the society with nearly all of its funds, and the returns are used to:

1. Operate the Children's hospital school in Eugene, where children from more than 20 Oregon counties are receiving special care, treatment and education;
2. Provide a summer camp for crippled children near Reedsport, where youngsters can enjoy the outdoors under careful and expert supervision;
3. Maintain a Craft Shop for the Handicapped in Portland, where articles made by physically handicapped are marketed to the public.
4. Operate a speech center in Portland, which provides speech therapy for persons with speech problems, and

ASC Announces Bean Support for This Year's Crop

The Malheur county ASC office has announced that notice of the 1954 bean support program had been received. The 1954 crop of dry edible beans will be supported at a national average price of \$7.24 per hundred pounds.

The support program which provides a level of support at 80 per cent of the Feb. 15, 1954 parity price for all dry edible beans, is contingent upon sufficient Commodity Credit Corp. funds being available. The level for the 1954 crop is designed to help this year's acreage in approximate balance with needed production without resort to acreage allotments.

Price support for 1953 crop beans was based on a national average support price of \$7.79 per hundred pounds, which was equal to approximately 87 per cent of the Dec. 15, 1952 parity price for dry edible beans. Price of beans under the 1954 program as in 1953 will be supported by nonrecourse loans to producers and through purchase agreements with producers. Loans and purchase agreements will be available from time of harvest through January, 1955.

5. Provide medical and surgical care for individuals unable to qualify for assistance from any other agency, either public or private.

Oregon Irrigation Outlook Varied, Says State SCS

Oregon irrigation water users will hear final water supply forecasts for 1954 at a series of regional meetings March 28 through April 12, reports W. T. Frost, Soil Conservation service hydraulic engineer and Oregon snow survey leader.

Forecasts are based on records of 79 measured snow courses, and include snowcover, soil moisture, reservoir water, precipitation and stream flow throughout the state. The snow surveys and water forecasts are a cooperative project of the USDA soil conservation service, Oregon State college agricultural experiment station and U. S. weather bureau.

The first forecast meeting of the series, for the northcentral region of the state, will be held March 28 at Hood River. Other meetings are: central Oregon at Bend, March 30; Harney basin, Burns, and John Day basin, Canyon City, March 31; Umatilla-Walla Walla region, Pendleton, April 1; northeastern Oregon, La Grande, April 2; southeastern Oregon, Vale, April 3; southcentral Oregon, Lakeview, April 5; southern Oregon, Medford, April 7; and Columbia basin, Portland, April 12.

Frost says the preliminary water supply outlook for Oregon on March 1, was "excellent" to "poor."

Water content of mountain snow-cover averages 102 percent normal compared with 99 percent normal a year ago. By watersheds, snow-cover varies from a high of 173 percent of normal in the Illinois river watershed to a low of 47 percent in the Owyhee river watershed.

Soils on mountain watersheds are well wetted under present snow-cover, reports Frost. An exception is in the extreme eastern portion of the state where fall precipitation was short.

State-wide precipitation, September through February, averaged 104 percent of the 10-year average.

The snow survey leader indicates the outlook for April-September streamflow in 1954 varies from "excellent" to "poor" assuming normal winter conditions in March.

County FB Voices Opposition To Social Security

The Malheur county Farm Bureau held its monthly officers meeting March 2 at the Farm Bureau building at Cairo. It was reported that 301 new members had joined the organization to that date.

Several new resolutions were read from other counties of the state, among them was a resolution regarding optional participation in future social security benefits as they pertain to farmers.

There is a bill in Congress to make a blanket application of social security to all farmers to be paid in a manner of income tax. The Farm Bureau is opposed to this proposal.

As the bill stands, the farmer would be required to pay 3 percent of earnings up to \$3600 to social security and an additional 2 percent would be paid by the farmer for his half of social security for each of his hired men. Payments would be compulsory.

These rates would increase by 1960 to 5 percent for hired men and 3 3/4 for farmers; in 1965 to 6 percent for hired men and 4 1/2 percent for farmers.

In dollars and cents it would be this: to begin with the farmer would pay \$108 per year, plus \$48 per year for each hired man on a basis of \$200 per month, for a total of \$156. By 1970 the farmer would pay \$175.51 per year, plus \$78 per year for each hired man, or a total of \$253.51 on a basis of one hired man.

The Farm Bureau is opposed to this and they feel participation should be optional.

A new resolution was presented in regard to electric power and phone rates, and a new resolution favoring an open ballot in the primary so that voters could vote for men of either party was read.

More was heard on the livestock disease laboratory and reports from other states show livestock men to be enthusiastic about the idea.

It was voted that the Farm Bureau building be available as a meeting place for other farm organizations and farm groups.

Letters were read from Burton S. Hutton, state 4-H club leader of Corvallis and James R. Huber, county extension agent for 4-H club work at La Grande, expressing their appreciation for the Farm Bureau's sponsoring the 4-H club banquet held in Ontario.
