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Political Season Arrives With Spring

The public will be hearing and reading millions of words from political aspirants for office during the next eight months as we embark on the primary election campaign that will be followed by the general election.

Missionary Speaks At Lutheran Church

Missionary Emil F. Hennemann, D. D., will speak at Faith Lutheran church, Park avenue at Fifth street in Nyssa on Sunday at 8 p. m.

A missionary of the American Lutheran church to New Guinea for the past 30 years, Dr. Hennemann is now home on furlough.

He is living with his wife and four of his five children in Madison, South Dakota until his return to New Guinea later this year.

Dr. Hennemann is a native of Ramona, S. D. He attended Eureka Lutheran Academy and College; Wartburg College, then in Clinton, Iowa; Wartburg Seminary, Dubuque, Iowa; Livingstone College, London, England, and the University of Chicago. He was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor by Wartburg Seminary in 1953.

He has been primarily interested in educational work among New Guinea men, having headed up the Amron Seminary near Madang, which trains young men for church work. On his present furlough, Dr. Hennemann has been doing literary work in preparation for his next term of service.

There is great need for books in the Graged language, spoken by the natives of the Madang area, and Dr. Hennemann is endeavoring to supply this need.

The public is invited to hear this veteran missionary when he speaks at Faith Lutheran church on Sunday evening, Mar. 28.

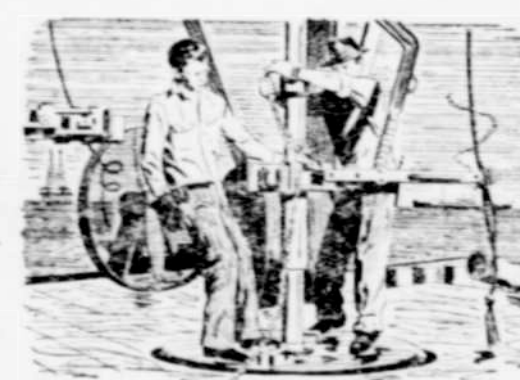
