From the Journal Files

10 Years Ago—April 6, 1944

Rev. and Mrs. Lloyd Pounds were re-appointed pastors of the Full Gospel church. — Dale Brandon has been appointed as city Marshal. Mayor Herchel Thompson announced. — Mrs. Helen Gonyer resigned her position as intermediate teacher in the Owyhee to take a position in Nyssa. Mrs. McConnell of Arcadia has been secured to finish her term of school. — No low pressure water will be available in Nyssa this year, city officials reported, because the low pressure line is in bad condition as a result of roots breaking the joints. Every water user will be billed on the high pressure basis. — Frank Ray purchased the John Reece ranch. — Carlos Buchner was appointed zone chairman of the Nyssa-Ontario-Weiser zone of the Lions club.

15 Years Ago—April 6, 1939

The house on the old Charles Marshall place, occupied by the Lawrence Blodgett family was burned to the ground. — The Nyssa high school board employed James Bushong, superintendent of schools at Embler, as superintendent of the local high school for one year. — They have struck soft water at the Art Eastman ranch. This means another farmer won't have to haul water next winter from the Owyhee river. — Sixty-six reclamation men, including employees from the Owyhee project were present at a safety meeting held at the Nyssa reclamation office. — Owen Davis, son of Mrs. S. B. Davis who has been employed in Florence, Oreg., as a landscape architect has been transferred to the McKinley National park in Alaska.

20 Years Ago—April 5, 1934

Mrs. C. W. Barrett reported that for the first time in her 21 years in Nyssa, her petunias survived the winter months and did not freeze. She said even the chickens rushed the season, she will have spring friers in a few days from a brood hatched at a Christmas setting. Another gardener reported 15 varieties of flowers in bloom. — Lott D. Brown, attorney of Baker, has purchased the library and office equipment of the late Atty. E. M. Blodgett. — Hundreds of Nyssa people thronged to the station to greet the latest edition of the "iron horse" the new streamline train of the U. P. which has been named the Golden Arrow. C. C. Hunt was permitted to ride on the new train from Huntington. He was water boy in 1883 when the first railroad grade was built by his father between Payette and Wieser. Mayor Howard Larsen, Dr. J. J. Sarazin, Frank T. Morgan and Dr. E. D. Norcott also made the trip from Huntington to Nyssa.

25 Years Ago—April 5, 1929

H. D. Holmes has purchased 15 lots in Ward's addition from C. C.

Hunt. The lots adjoins Mr. Holmes property at the highway bridge and he plans to make extensive improvements. — Getting ready for hot weather, six new electric refrigerators were delivered to the Owyhee damsite by the Idaho Power Co. — The Civic club has designated April 12, as the day for planting trees in the city park. It is expected that 200 trees will be planted at this time, about 40 having been donated by individuals and the balance bought by the Civic and Commercial clubs. — The town council took possession of its own quarters in the Blackman building this week. This will also be the new home of the city library, presided over by Mrs. F. R. Marshall.

35 Years Ago—April 4, 1919

Joe Meyer has sold his 120-acre homestead on the Eastside to Dave Hawkins for \$1200 or \$10 per acre. — Frank Miller and family of Payette have moved to Nyssa where Mr. Miller will have charge of the sub-station. — Mrs. Beatrice Wilson has purchased the Van Gilse residence property in the north part of town for a consideration of \$1550. The property consists of a fine residence and outbuildings and seven lots. — Mrs. T. M. Lowe of Owyhee was appointed Malheur county historian, by Miss Cornelia Marvin, state historian. — Charles Garrison purchased a new Briscoe car from the Central Garage. — The saddle pony belonging to Lon Pratt grazed too close to the steep bank of the river, which caved in with her, giving her an enforced bath. She swam across the river and was towed back by Messrs. DeBord and Dawes who went across in their boat.

40 Years Ago—April 2, 1914

The Nyssa cheese factory continues to make big gains in the amount of high grade cheese produced. — For the first time in the history of the town the lid was on Nyssa Sunday, and not a card was shuffled nor was a billiard ball rolled. However, we can still go to the depot and watch the trains come in. — H. D. Birdsall has traded his East Side hotel, which he owned and conducted the past five years, to Frank Dutcher for a ranch in Long Valley. — The famous KSD ranch below Nyssa owned by Fred Keisel of Ogden, is pulling up 10 acres of mixed orchard 17 years old and will set out Italian prune trees in their stead. — Daddy Smith has closed his shoe shop in Nyssa and departed for the high hills near Baker where he will engage in prospecting during the summer. — Wm. Ward has rented his place to Henry Pratt. Mr. Ward expects to leave soon for Prairie City to engage in mining. — E. F. Pratt recently filed on the desert claim near Adrian formerly held by Thos. M. Nelson of Boise.
