Gerald Cox fanned 13 Caldwell batters and Johnny Lienkaemper was responsible for the only score in the game when he came in during the fifth on a hit made by Johnny Simianer.

A "no count" extra inning was played after the seventh with three runs being added; one by Loejov, Holcomb and Lienkaemper.

The following Tuesday evening, Nampa came through with a 4-3 victory after the host team had scored in the second, then let Nyssa bring in 3 in the fifth. Nyssa took the lead in the first of the fifth inning when Lienkaemper scored on an error after singling. Holcomb and Savage followed Lienkaemper in the scoring spurt.

Nyssa Boat Club To Sponsor Movie

"White Water Stampede," a movie which has been discussed in the February issue of the "Outdoor Life" magazine, is scheduled to be shown in the Little Theatre April 13. This adventure film will be under the sponsorship of the Nyssa Boat Club.

Photographer and producer of the film is Merle L. Tobias of Portland, who is regarded as one of the nation's foremost cameramen in the 16mm field. Tobias also holds honors for running rivers. He ran the Owyhee river in the late '30's and the Snake in the late '20's and since that time has run rivers all over the world.

"White Water Stampede," was taken on the Middle Fork of the Salmon river in Idaho, which is considered one of the most dangerous white water streams in the world. According to Tobias, the film covers highlights of four trips on the river, one of which ended in disaster but without loss of lives.

"Bohemian Camping," a picture photographed in a remote section of the British Columbia Mainland, will be the companion feature on the April 13 program. It deals with fabulous fishing, abundant wildlife marvelous scenery and the little known tribe of Chilcotin Indians who inhabit this region.

Both of the films have been praised for their footage of wild animals. Included in the list of wild animals photographed are rare sequences of wild mountain sheep, bear, deer, elk, moose, otter and mountain goats. Tobias is scheduled to be on hand to personally narrate the film and tell of his adventures in the Idaho wilderness area.
