Nyssa Wins Six Way Track Meet

Coach Kinsey Kevern's cinder pounders won over five competitors in the second meet of the season for the Nyssa Bulldogs. Final scores were as follows: Nyssa 58 1/6, Vale 34 1/3, Ontario 30, Weiser 18 2/3, Adrian 12 1/2 and Meridian 11 1/3.

The results were as follows: Keck of Nyssa, Bumgarner of Nyssa and Baker of Weiser went 9 ft. 7 in. to tie for first place in the pole vault event.

Carroll of Nyssa threw the javelin 144 ft. 5 in. to place first in that event with Burt of Vale, second and Siamanier of Nyssa, third.

Forbess of Nyssa went 19 ft. 3 in. to place first in the broad-jump. Wright of Meridian placed second and McConaha of Ontario, third.

In the discus throw, Dorman of Ontario placed first with 119.6 ft. Binder of Ontario and Keck of Nyssa placed second and third, respectively.

Nyssa took first three places in the high jump to set a new record for this meet. Bumgarner went 6 ft. to place first with Toombs second and Cooper, third.

Cottle placed first in the high hurdles for Nyssa with Robertson of Weiser, second and Snider of Nyssa, third.

The mile was run in 5 minutes, 3 seconds by Payne of Vale. Haney of Adrian placed second and Musgrove of Vale placed third.

Payne of Vale also took the 880 yard run with a time of 2 minutes, 15.5 seconds. Pruyn of Nyssa was second and Haney of Adrian, third.

Weiser won the mile relay with a time of 3 minutes, 51.5 seconds. Vale placed second and Meridian, third.

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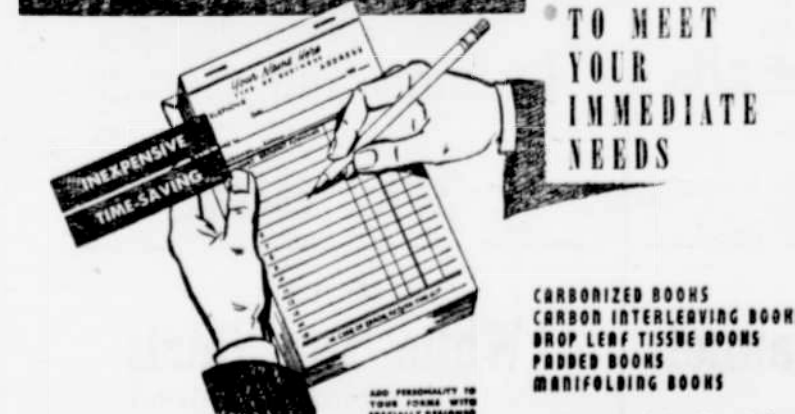
