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A tomato aspic offers another excellent gelatin base for vegetable salad interest.

Garden Patch Aspic

1 envelope unflavored gelatin ½ teaspoon pepper
½ cup cold tomato juice 1 tablespoon lemon juice
1¼ cups hot tomato juice 1 cup diced cucumber
¼ teaspoon salt ½ cup sliced radishes

Sprinkle gelatin on cold tomato juice to soften. Dissolve thoroughly in hot tomato juice. Season and flavor with salt, pepper and lemon juice. Chill until the consistency of unbeaten egg white. Fold in cucumber and radishes. Turn into large or individual molds; chill until firm.

YIELD: 4 servings.

Recital to Be Given Friday

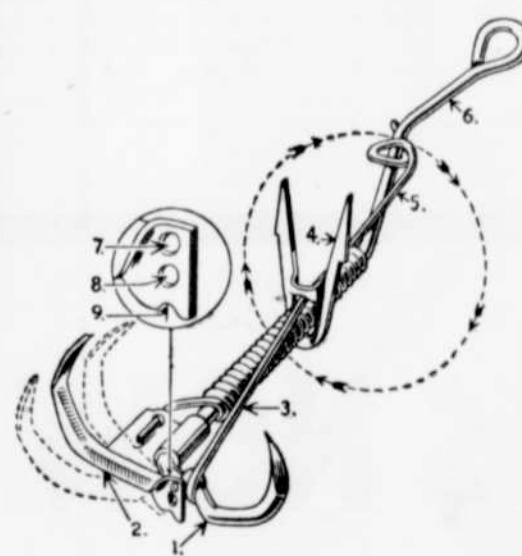
Students of Barbara Attebery will be presented in a piano recital April 30 at 8 p. m. at the Methodist church. The public is invited.

The next meeting will be at the home of Mrs. Houston Wilson with Mrs. Edward Boydell, co-hostess. Subject of the day will be peonies.

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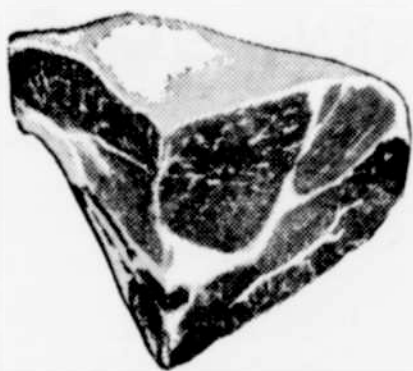
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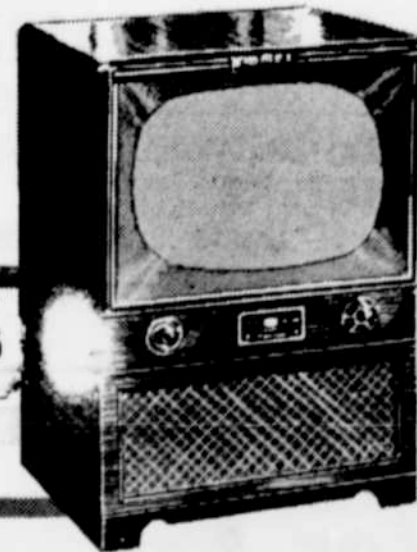
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
