Fiction is prominent in the titles going into circulation on Saturday, May 1, at the Malheur County Library.

Lost Shepherd by Agnes Sanford is the story of how a young minister whose own faith was foundering achieved a deeper spiritual awareness.

Rosamond Lehmann tells the story of two sisters' love for the same man in The Echoing Grove, showing the three as they appear to themselves, to one another, and to family and friends.

The Buffalo Wallow is Charles Tenny Jackson's account of his Nebraska prairie boyhood of the eighties.

Mackinlay Kantor has written a sequel to one of his well-known stories, this one called The Daughter of Bugle Ann.

An anthology of stories for men edited by Charles Grayson called The Fourth Round includes authors like Hemingway, Edmonds, Steinbeck, Gallico, and Bromfield.

Crystal Clear by Elizabeth Cadell tells of his family's search for the woman after Paul Saxon reads in the London Times that he is engaged to a woman whom he has never heard of.

Swords of Anjo by Mario Pei is a novel of the Middle Ages based on the "Song of Roland," telling a love story of love, treachery, and battle against the background of feudal France and Moorish Spain.

Cesare Pavese, an Italian novelist who died in 1950, had published The Moon and the Bonfires shortly before his death. This is a story of an Italian peasant's return to his native village after having failed to take roots in America, only to experience anguish at the uprootedness of modern life as he searches for the companions of his youth.

Monsoon Quarter is a novel by Marion Lowndes about the power of Kurt Long on his isolated island and the web into which Tempe Jarvis was drawn when the moonlight kept her prisoner there.

In sports Tales and Anecdotes Frank Menke brings together highlights and high spots from the annals of more than a dozen sports.

Flower arranging is the subject of two books. Elizabeth Bear's book is Better Flower Arrangements for Home and Exhibition. Another aspect of the subject is treated by Marie Wood in Flower Arrangements Judged and Point Scored.

Denizens of the Deep is a collection of true tales of deep-sea fishing by Philip Wylie.

Quentin Reynolds writes the biography of James H. Doolittle, the man who led the Tokyo raid in The Amazing Mr. Doolittle.

The handbook Window Display by Nestor Castro includes material on modern store fronts, lighting effects, draping the mannequin, lettering, figure drawing, pinning, display fixtures and materials, and papier mache.

Antique Guns by Frank Bowman includes pictures and historical details concerning mainly small firearms.

Witches Three includes three stories: "Conjure Wife" by Fritz Leiber, "There Shall Be No Darkness" by James Blish, and "The Blue Star" by Fletcher Pratt.

Short stories are to be found in three books: Best Detective Stories of the Year, 1953 edited by David Cooke; Island of the Blue Macaws, and Sixteen Other Stories by James Ullman; and Nine Stories by Jerome Salinger.

A mystery story concludes the list: Death Meets 400 Rabbits by Aaron Marc Stein, concerning murder in Mexico.

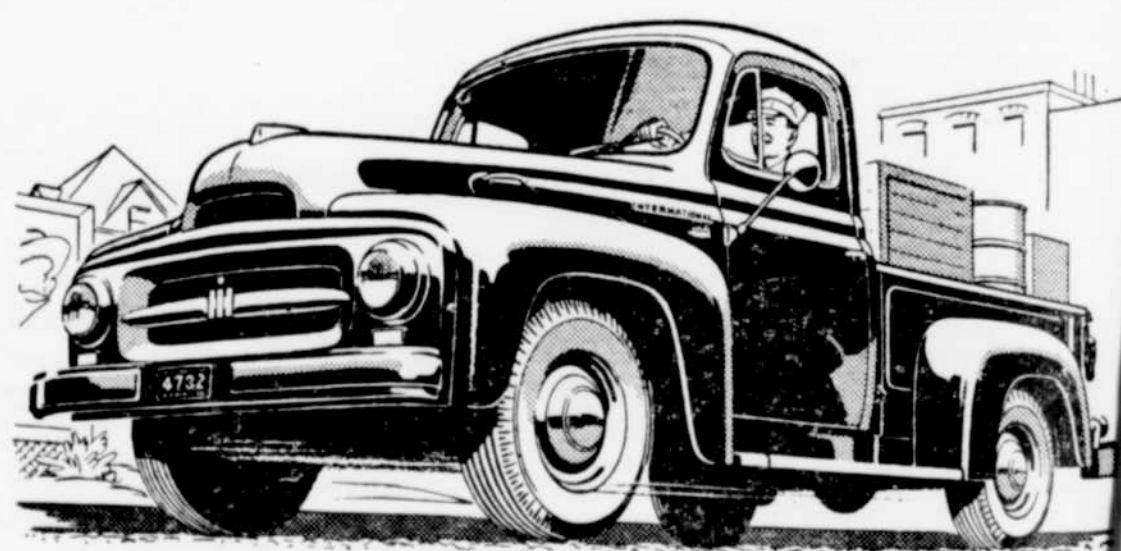
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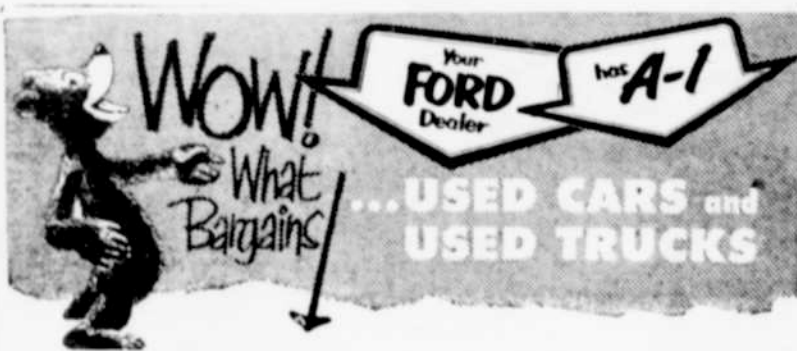
