### Send Stunz to Salem

Democratic voters will do well to give careful consideration to aspirants for nominations in the May primaries and choose Emil Stunz as their candidate for state representative. If he is nominated his chances are excellent to be elected next November to give Eastern Oregon better-than-average representation in the state capital.

Mr. Stunz is a man we have followed closely for two years by observing his actions on the city council and as an active member and director of the Chamber of Commerce. No slouch on the rudiments of legislative matters, whether they are municipal or state, he faces all issues squarely and makes decisions he believes are for the overall good of the general public.

He has established a successful business in Nyssa through his ability as a sound business man while eyeing community problems with an objective view. While his civic interests have been concentrated on Nyssa and the surrounding community, he has at all times been extremely conscious of Malheur county and Eastern Oregon with the objective that what is good for the county is good for Nyssa.

We are particularly impressed with his lack of a long list of campaign promises and impossible plans to funnel an unreasonable amount of state funds into Eastern Oregon. He is emphasizing one issue which all of us should be concerned about. That's the re-apportionment proposal which was snowed under two years ago in a legislative committee, giving the voters a watered-down substitute on which to vote.

Malheur county is served by one representative and shares a senator with two other counties, which is utterly ridiculous since both are chosen on two different sets of population figures. Mr. Stunz is well versed on the proposal to have Oregon adopt the federal plan to give Malheur the same voice as Multnomah or any other county in the senate and representation by population in the house.

Without shouting or rash promises, he is spending unlimited time on this and numerous other issues which we believe will be of benefit to all residents of Malheur county if he is selected as our next representative.

### Consider Goodell's Record

On the Republican ballot, voters will be doing themselves and Malheur county a service by giving careful consideration to the candidates for the nomination for county commissioner. Since the Democrats have no candidate for this post, the Republican nomination is almost assurance of election in view of the American public's dim view of write-in candidates.

Alva Goodell has an excellent record in that there has been nothing spectacular other than a tremendous amount of work for the good of the taxpayers and the people he served during his tenure of office. Malheur county is operating on a budget partly supplied by a tax levy of slightly more than 11 mills and the funds have to be watched. He has been conscious of the manner in which the money is spent, yet the county has continued to be progressive in most respects. Its road problems are a headache, but county roads are being maintained fairly well with limited funds in spite of predictions to the contrary when the county-wide tax levy was defeated. He has never believed in neglecting any county function under the county court's jurisdiction just to influence taxpayers to vote themselves more taxes.

Mr. Goodell has fought for the rights of the Nyssa Road Improvement district, which could be hampered somewhat if a minority group made up of die-hards who profess to wield political influence were given free rein.

The present commissioner was one of those leading the campaign to oust chiselers from the relief rolls and was successful in enlisting the aid of enough officials to prevent what might have been an awkward situation, both financially and politically.

Just like the Democrat we mention above, this Republican candidate for nomination and re-election, has made few if any campaign promises. His record as a county commissioner and his record as a successful farmer, which is a business and a science in this modern age, are far more valuable than silly promises that he and all thinking voters know cannot be fulfilled.
