

Teen-Age Road-e-o Scheduled May 22; 4 Judges Chosen

Four judges for the Nyssa Junior Chamber of Commerce teen-age Road-e-o to be held at the rear of the Nyssa grade school on May 22, were named today by Elmer Jaques, Jaycee sub-committee chairman.

The four judges will serve on the skill test course and will monitor the written quiz. The skill test judges are Alton P. Bunder, superintendent of Idaho State Police, who will judge on driving between pairs of rubber balls; John C. Elfering, Malheur county sheriff, serpentine exercises; Sargeant Haines, Oregon State Police officer, smooth stopping; and Dale Boyer, district manager of the Motor Vehicle Bureau, parallel parking.

The written quiz will be monitored by two other judges whose names will be released at a later date. None of the judges will be Jaycees and the two phases of the Road-e-o examination will be given on May 22.

This will be the first annual teen-age Road-e-o to be staged by the Nyssa Jaycees. Dale Overstake, general chairman for the Road-e-o said this week that a number of teen-agers have already signed up for the event, which would indicate a large number of participants.

Overstake reported that the committee on prizes is working toward making the occasion a memorable event for the winners. The local winner will proceed to the state contest sometime in June. The winner of the state contest will represent Oregon in the national contest where the contests will compete for \$3,100 in scholarships.

Golf Tournament Friday, Saturday

The fifth annual Ontario amateur golf championship, sponsored by the Ontario Chamber of Commerce, has been scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, according to E. W. Jorgensen, chairman. The medal play is for 54 holes and the other flights are for 36 holes. Friday will be free practice play for all contestants.

A new feature has been added this year, a pro flight of nine holes with a field of ten for a \$100 purse. If enough professionals are not entered, low scoring amateurs will complete the round. Jorgensen listed merchandise prizes of \$700 to be awarded to the winners. Awards will also be made for the low scores on each of the 18 holes, closest to the pin on short holes, high scores and long drives.

Nearly 100 competed last year, with players from most towns in 200 mile radius. Pete Parrish, course manager says the course will be in top condition for the contests.

County Stockmen Vote Assessment

The Malheur County Livestock association voted last Saturday to support a disease prevention program in the northwest and to assess themselves as much as 10 cents a head on cattle sold to finance an advertising and sales campaign to sell more meat.

Action was taken at a meeting of the association by 80 members at Jordan Valley.

They also voted to ask the Oregon State Cattlemen's association for a program in which the cattlemen can determine the number of cattle to be grazed on federal lands.

Principal speaker at the meeting was Hugh J. Walker, cashier and comptroller of the United States National bank of Portland who advised cattlemen that markets will be stabilized even though the industry is in for a "tough pull."

Throws Javelin To Beat Own Record

Leo Long of Stanford university pitched the javelin 226 feet 7½ inches Saturday for the best collegiate toss this season, according to the Sunday morning Statesman. The tall, blond Long led his Indian track team to a 67½-63½ victory over the UCLA Bruins in a meet that was settled only by the Indian's 25-yard victory in the mile relay.

Long's throw broke his own 1954 mark, 221 feet 6 3/8 inches. It also set a new meet record, besting the 224 feet 8½ inches toss by Bud Held of Stanford in 1948, according to the article.
