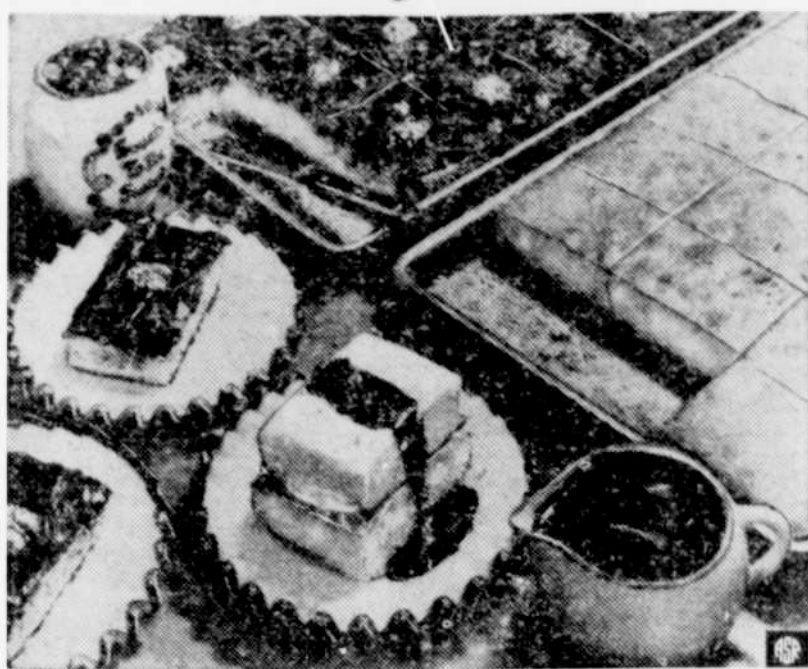

2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup sifted confectioners' sugar

3 to 4 tablespoons hot milk, for frosting

YIELD: Frosting for top of 10 x 15 inch cake, or 1½ cups chocolate sauce.
