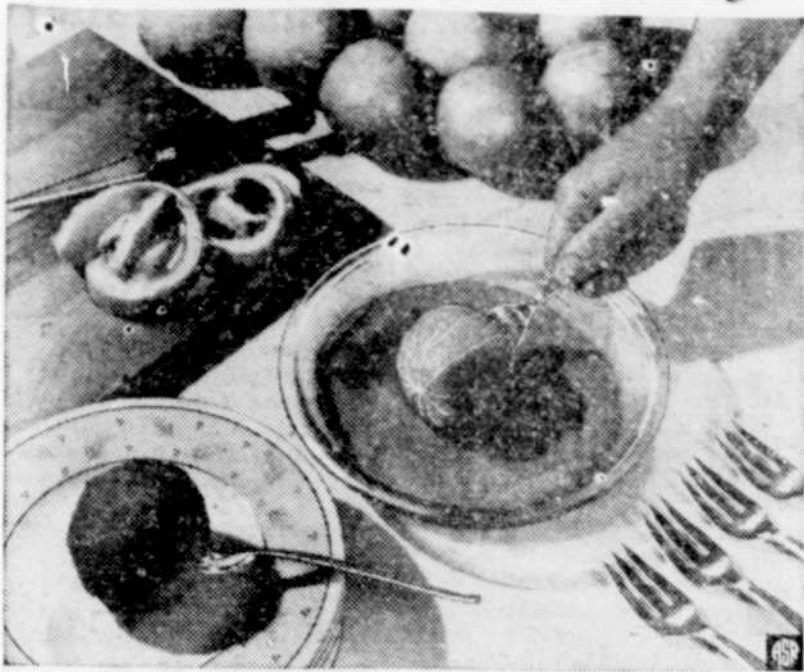
Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Seuell and family took a car of Cub Scouts to Vale Sunday where they visited the oil wells.

**Your Library**

A diplomat's views on India and Asia headlines the books going into circulation on Saturday, May 15, at the Malheur County Library. Other titles include fiction, the accounts of naturalists and of spelunkers information on world resources and kitchen remodeling.

"Ambassador's Report" is Chester Bowles' description of "the underlying forces which today influence Asian action and thinking" together with his suggestions for a few essential principles on which to base a constructive American policy.

"The Spare Room" by Nella Gardner White is a story of a bitter young man who comes to live in the spare room of the town's visiting nurse, Ann Pilchard, and disrupts her life with his hostility toward people.

Margery Sharp's new novel "The Gypsy in the Parlor" tells how Stephen, the youngest, was the first Sylvester to choose his own life, but when Fanny Davis arrived, fell into a decline and turned the parlour into a sickroom, the other Sylvesters took action.

Leicester Hemingway, younger brother of Ernest, writes a first novel, "The Sound of the Trumpet," a documentary about two war photographers.

Ketti Shalom by James Muddock is the story of a remarkable woman with dreams for her people in the days of the British Mandate preceding Israel.

Margaret Long's novel "Affair of the Heart" is the story of the attempts of progressive newspaper people to establish an independent paper as spokesman for liberals in a Georgia community, and the personal story of Carter Kelly whose ex-husband has returned to edit the new paper.

"The Whispering Pine" by Sara Ware Bassett finds Carlotta Hollis the unexpected owner of a quaint old Boston house beneath a pine tree after her bidding at an auction without intending to buy.

The expedition of two young naturalists to the rain forests in Africa to collect rare animals and birds for British zoos is the sub-

ject of "The Overloaded Ark" by Gerald Durrell.

"Lost Pony Tracks" is Ross Santee's telling in words and pictures of his experience as a horse wrangler in Arizona.

Underground exploration is the Pyrenees in 1951 and 1952 is the subject of "Caves of Adventure" by Haroun Tazieff. Spelunkers, or cave explorers, went 2,000 feet underground in two French expeditions, discovering enormous caverns and encountering hazards.

Fieldwork Osborn analyzes the earth's capacity to provide for the worldwide increase in population in "The Limits of the Earth."

"The Kitchen Book: Planning and Remodeling" by Reginald Hawkins makes better kitchens available to more people, illustrating kitchens designed to take the drudgery out of kitchen work.

"Cabinet making and Millwork" by Alf Dahl and J. D. Wilson contains material on tools, materials, and layout.

Careers and personalities of the musical performers of our time are found in "Music Makers" by Roland Gelatt.

"Japan, Past and Present" by Edwin Reischauer is a brief Japanese history, confining itself to essentials and presenting the complex story in broadly interpretive terms.

"Freedom and Public Education" is an anthology on current problems in American education edited by Ernest Melby and Morton Puner. Its sections include "Today's Challenge," "The Attacks on Modern Education," and "Education and its Critics."

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**Oregon and U. S.****Cattle Numbers****Hit New High**

Cattle numbers in Oregon, the U. S., and the world have reached a record high this year.

Ed Coles, extension livestock marketing specialist at Oregon State college, reports that on January 1, 1954, Oregon had a total of 1,429,000 cattle, the U. S. had 94,600,000 and the world about 856,000,000 cattle.

As nations go, India ranks first in total numbers with nearly 200,000,000 head. Cattle in India are used primarily for draft purposes. The U. S. is considered first in beef production in the world.

Coles says the marked upswing in cattle production in the world since World War II is showing signs of slowing down. There was only an increase of 7,000,000 head during 1953 as compared with 19,000,000 head a year earlier. In 1951, the increase was 24,000,000 head.

This slower rate of increase may be an indication that cattle numbers will reach a peak this year in the U. S., Coles explains.
