 FFA animals need not be eligible for registration. All animals must pass health tests as required by the county and state fairs.

The judges for the contests will be Rex Ross of Mount Angel, Ore. and E. J. Johannesen of Emmett, Ida. Ross was judge at the Utah State Fair in 1953 and is a prominent West Coast breeder and an importer of cattle from the Jersey Islands. Johannesen, who is the county agent for Gem county, will judge at the Utah State Fair this year.

Henry Reuter is expeditor and the clerks are Leeds and Marie Bailey and George Bain.

The sponsorship of the show is by the Malheur county Jersey Cattle club in cooperation with the chambers of commerce, business firms and many individuals of Malheur county, the Nyssa school district, the county extension service and the FFA.

### Poppy Facts Told By Mrs. Heldt; Sale Sat., May 29

Poppy Day in Nyssa has been set for Saturday, May 29. Mrs. A. L. Heldt, chairman of the sale, to emphasize its importance to disabled veterans, said that the memorial poppies are made of red crepe paper, by hand, by disabled veterans in hospitals and poppy workrooms in 40 states and that they receive pay for each poppy made, the material being furnished free.

Each year more than 25,000,000 poppies are made by the disabled veterans and are sold under the American Legion auxiliary supervision by 125,000 volunteer workers who receive no compensation, Mrs. Heldt continued.
