Study Your Candidates

Voters have slightly more than five months to decide who they will choose for the various state and county offices which is sufficient time to give careful study to the platforms of the several candidates. Since there are only a few county and state posts to be filled, the coming campaign will lack the excitement of a national presidential election when most of the county and state officials are elected.

In recent years fewer and fewer people have been adhering to strict party lines in their choice of public officials, but while this change has been taking place, political philosophies are undergoing just as many changes.

Personal ability and the individual background of each candidate has to be considered by the voter when he marks an X on the ballot, hoping to give the candidate two, four or six years in office. The voter, even though he is alone in the voting booth, may sometimes have to struggle with his conscience to select those he thinks will do the most good for the greatest number of people instead of those who might grant personal favors.

A good formula for choosing public officials is to consider their approach during the campaign. More often than not, a candidate who refrains from the use of phrases that encompass unknown factors is more sound than one who attempts to appeal to the public with generalized name-calling.

"Special privilege groups," "Wall Street interests," "big business," and "reactionaries," are phrases that more and more have a hollow sound as do "communist-infiltrated," "red-tinged," "left-winger" and "socialistic."

To use any of those phrases promiscuously is to admit weakness on the part of a candidate who lacks sincere ideals and strong convictions. It is probably true that some danger exists from any of the "groups" that have been dubbed with fancy names, but none could gain power in this country if the American people would make use of their privileges to take an active part in politics and to vote at election time.

Think hard about the people who are seeking office and compare them with those who have become legends in American history or in the community life of a small locality. Almost without exception, the real statesmen gained their offices and their eventual fame by means of their own initiative, integrity and ability, and not by classifying a segment of the population as though they were bugs being studied by a biology class.

Criticism of the actions of individuals is fine, but it should be carefully aimed and the pitcher should be sure of his target. To include suggestive innuendoes to encompass the so-called "groups" is much like throwing a handful of mud into a large crowd—too many people are smeared with the muck that was not aimed at them.

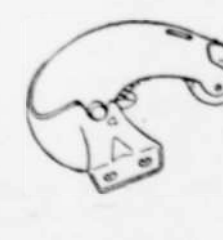

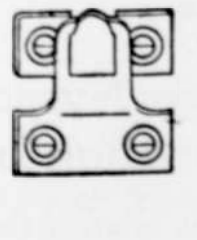
