Fuel Oil Truck Meters Will Be Tested June 1

The state department of agriculture's fuel oil meter testing truck will move to Malheur county June 1 for a two-weeks stand. Major stops will be at Ontario, Nyssa and Vale.

All Idaho trucks delivering fuel into Oregon need to be tested at the same time Oregon trucks are tested.

This special testing truck is equipped to check meters on all trucks which deliver fuel oil to homes and gasoline to service stations. The testing truck is set up at a central distributing plant in each town and all trucks in the area are notified when to check in for their annual check. In this manner, little disruption of local deliveries occurs.

J. E. Kitchen of Salem is the inspector in charge of this truck which operates virtually on a year round basis to cover the entire state in this particular weights and measures field. Kitchen says that so far this year it has been necessary to condemn very few fuel meters. All meters which are delivering correct volume when checked are licensed and sealed. Meters which are making incorrect delivery are condemned.
