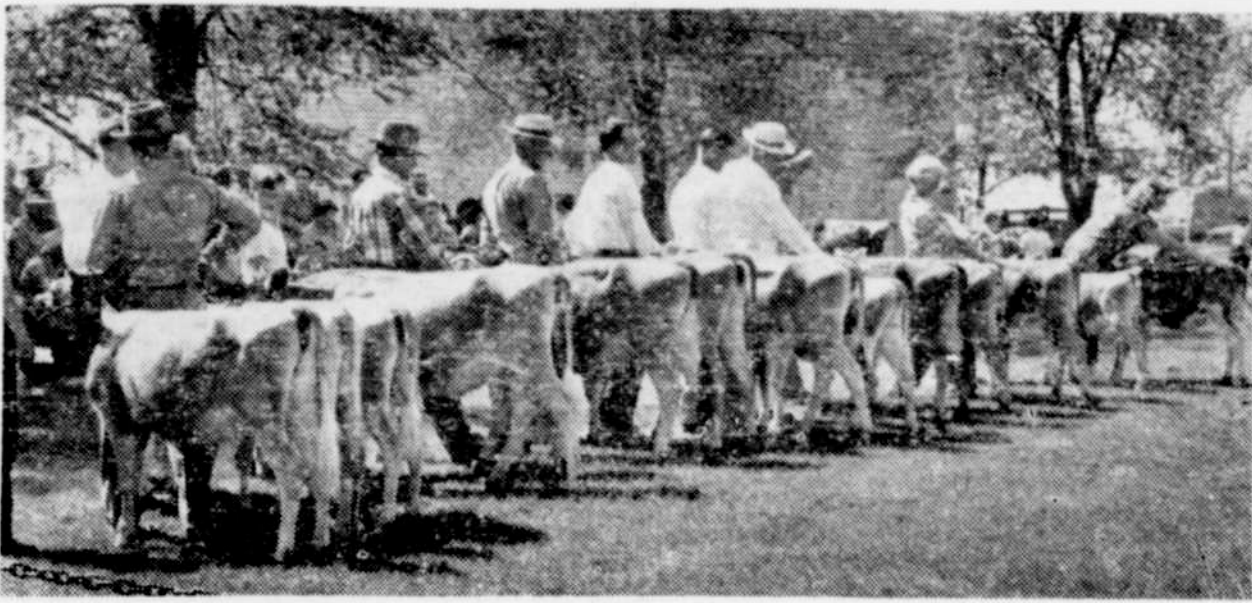




Days Gone By in Nyssa Community

10 Years Ago—June 1, 1944

A white nanny goat has contributed \$77 to the funds of the Nyssa post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion. Probably a goat is not worth that much but the nanny was auctioned several times at the Bybee Livestock company after it was offered for sale by H. O. Hopkins. — The cow waddies have failed again to meet the challenge of the wild horses in the Owyhee breaks. A group of cowboys started to roundup 2000 head of mustangs roaming the ranges of southern Malheur county. They were scheduled to reach Rome, where corrals had been built for the horses, but before the end of the week their project had failed. Cowboys have tried on other occasions to capture some of the wild horses. — 2000 memorial poppies were sold last Saturday by the auxiliary of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars.

15 Years Ago—June 1, 1939

High temperatures during the month of May were the 15th and 28th when the mercury climbed to 95. — Edna Flannigan Farris, county health nurse for the past 7 years has tendered her resignation. She plans to attend the University of Oregon's Public Nursing school. — The city council awarded the contract for the construction of more than 20,000 feet of sewer to George W. Lind, Portland contractor, whose bid for the job was \$23,095.73. — Two new ordinances were passed

by the city council. The first, deals with the licensing of dogs. It requires every resident of Nyssa having dogs in their possession over 8 months old to have a license. The second is the ordinance which prohibits the parking of trucks or vehicles loaded with any commodity having an offensive odor, specifically meaning beet pulp. — Plans have been formulated for a Fall Festival to be held during the first part of September.

20 Years Ago—May 31, 1934

Twenty-one graduates of Nyssa high school received their diplomas at the gymnasium. Doris Smith gave the valedictory address and Delmer Keck gave a well delivered salutatory. Supt. Leo D. Hollenberg presented special awards to Earl Sager for all around athlete, Oswald Forbes won the football trophy and Meredith Seits the basketball honors. — A hay crew of ten men are putting up the first cutting of hay at the Deseret ranch. Margaret M. Anderson was nominated as postmaster of Jordan Valley. — Owen Price, Grant Rinehart and Coach John Young of the Nyssa high school faculty, have work for the summer months with Engineer O. G. Boden's crew on the Owyhee project. Close to 400 people are picking peas in this vicinity for the F. H. Hogue company.

Ground Observers Want Week's Alert

Two films on the importance of ground observation were shown at the meeting of the Nyssa post of the Ground Observer Corps, May 11, at the Veterans Hall.

Chief Observer, Ted Teske reported that the Corps, which now numbers 35 members, will try to reach a strength of 84. This will enable the Corps to maintain a full week's alert. Paul Penrod, supervisor, stated that this branch of the Air Defence Command is the only civilian organization directly connected with the military.

The Nyssa post has been assigned a set of field phones and an observation tower is being completed at the rodeo grounds. The next meeting will be held at the Veterans Hall in June 15. Qualified members will receive their wings and several appointments will be made. The meeting will be open to all interested parties.
