Deadline Set For 4-H Pigs, Sheep

Oregon 4-H club members carrying pig and sheep projects have until June 15 to get their young animals, according to Cal G. Monroe, state 4-H club agent.

He said prospects are good for selling the animals when the projects are completed.

Weaner pigs bought before the deadline will be eligible for participation in the pig feeding contest at the state fair, Monroe said. In this contest, pig club members must have a pen-of-three market pigs that weigh between 170 and 220 pounds at fair time. After judging, one animal is slaughtered to check on value of edible parts of the hog.
