

Grain Storage Problem Faces State Growers

Time is running out for grain growers who may need storage space for their new crop.

Ray Teal, extension seed marketing specialist at Oregon State college, says that in Oregon, space may be needed this season for 13 million bushels more wheat, barley, and oats than in 1953. This increase is due to a larger carry-over of old wheat and larger crops of barley and oats.

Teal says that although total storage space for grain in the Pacific Northwest seems adequate this year, there may be local storage shortages. This makes the problem one for each farmer to solve.

Barley will likely create the most serious storage problem, the specialist explains. Nearly 6,000,000 more bushels are expected to need storage space this year in Oregon.

Growers can make government support loans on their barley of from \$45 to \$55 a ton if suitable storage is available. However, much of this year's crop of barley may not find suitable storage space due to local conditions, Teal continues. This means there will likely be quite a bit of "free" barley at harvest time. The selling price for it will depend on how much there will be that won't find storage space.

During early May, California barley growers were being bid \$42 to \$43 a ton for bulk old crop barley in country ware, houses, says the specialist. Bids for new crop barley were made at \$40 f. o. b. country shipping points for future delivery.

These prices were reflecting a rather small available supply since most of the 1953 crop was under the loan program, Teal ex-

plains. They also reflected a good local feeder demand and a purchase of three cargoes by Japan. When the new crop "free" barley hits the market, prices to growers could easily be \$5 to \$10 lower, he adds.

The specialist says good storage suitable for the loan program can be built for about 40 to 50 cents a bushel. Every \$1 ton drop represents 2.4 cents a bushel. Therefore, if growers take \$30 a ton at harvest instead of the average Oregon country rate of \$50, the difference could have built the needed storage, he concludes.

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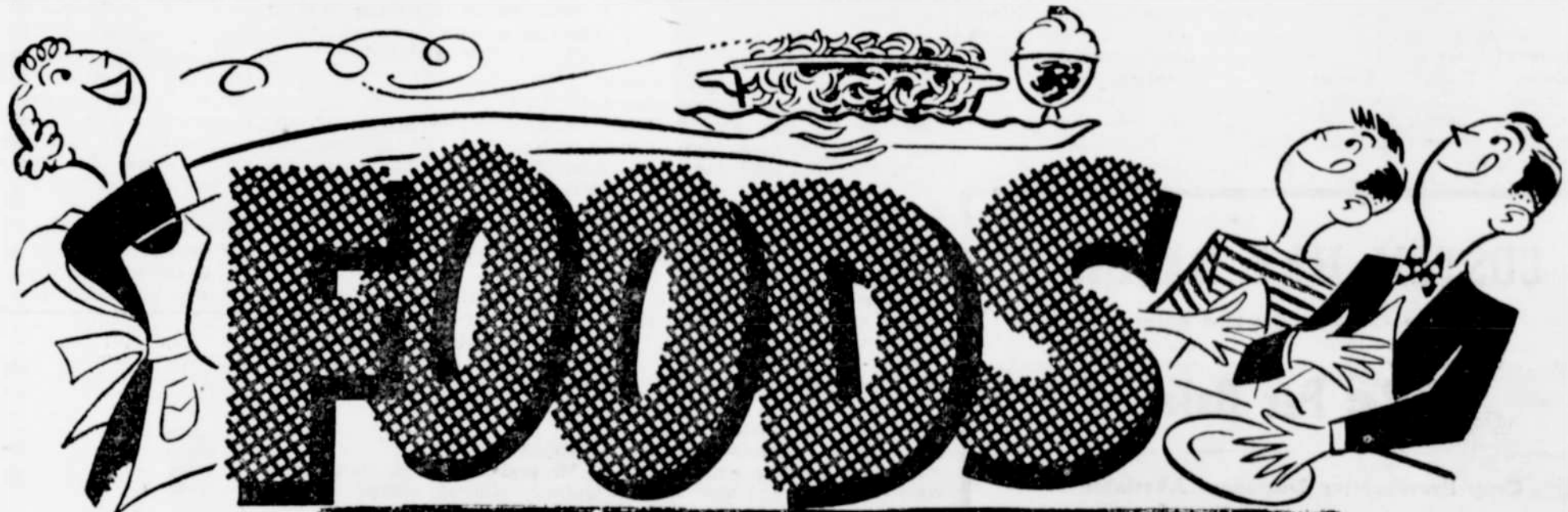
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
